## 16 Horses Lost In Fire

## Louis Has Charles And Walcott Under Contract

MIAMI, Fla., March 2 — (AP)—Promoter Joe Louis, who learned about contracts from Mike Jacobs, revealed today he had tied up the N.B.A. version of the heavyweight championship for his international boxing club with exclusive two-year agreements with Edward Charles and Jersey Joe Walcott.

"Charles or Walcott which ever wins in June, has agreed to fight only for us for two years," said Louis on his return from an exhibition bout at Nassau. "That was part of the deal by which they will fight for the title. The winner has to fight either Lee Savold or Gus Lesnevich in 90 days."

When Louis won his crown from Jim Braddock in 1937 he signed a 10-year exclusive with Uncle Mike. That contract was a most important factor in the rise to power of Jacob's 20th Century Sporting Club. Louis appears to be in the promotional game to stay with the substantial financial backing of his new partners, James D. Norris and Arthur Wirtz.

"I'll handle the big bouts," said the retired champ. "I will suggest the matches I think are the best. We'll still work with the local matchmakers in each city when we come in. We don't want to hurt anybody."

Louis sent out a batch of wires and air-mail letters today, informing all promoters and match-makers of his official retirement. He told them to expect to hear from him soon.

"We don't want any fight with Mike Jacobs," said Louis when informed of Jacobs' decision to return to active direction of the 20th century. "There ought to be room in New York for more than one promoter."

Actually the new organization has enormous resources to finance any prolonged war with other boxing promoters. It controls five arenas and already has the skeleton of a local staff in operation.

The James F. Norris who is one of the three partners in the International Boxing Club is the son of James Norris, Chicago grain operator. Wirtz, the third partner with Louis, is a partner with the two Norris men in a vast mid-west entertainment empire.

"After all it's just a case of Joe (Louis) coming back to us," said Norris. "We had him originally. He used to box for us in Detroit fresh out of the Golden Gloves."

Louis is still busy with a long exhibition schedule that probably will bring him \$120,000 for some 31 dates since Jan. 1.

The champ isn't quite ready for the old carpet slippers and the firebrand. He flattened his exhibition foe in Nassau for a six-count last night and still talks about beating everybody around.

## Canadian Waters Yield Four Of 14 First-Prize Fish

NEW YORK, March 2 — (CP) — Canadian lakes and rivers provided four of the 14 first-prize fish in Field and Stream Magazine's 1948 fishing contest.

But Canadian fishermen didn't do as well as Canadian waters. Of almost 200 anglers listed as prize winners, the magazine said today as it published the 1948 results, only 11 are Canadians.

Two third prizes were their highest awards. They also scored a fourth, two fifths, a 10th, and five honorable mentions.

Here are the year's record catches in the contest, in which the great majority of entrants are United States citizens:

Brook trout (fly-casting) — 7 lbs. 14 oz., caught Aug. 16 in Ontario's Nipigon River, using a Mickey Finn fly. B.H. Rieger of Toronto won honorable mention with a fish of 3 lbs. 4 oz. caught in Williams Lake, Ont.

Brook trout (open) — 7 lbs. 12 oz., Sept. 10 in Lake Nipigon, Ont., with a Gape's Negap lure. F.S. Williams of Port William, Ont., won third prize. His fish weighed 7 lbs. 9 oz., was caught in Lake Nipigon Sept. 9, on a Gape's Cockatoo lure. D.A. Clark of Port Arthur, Ont., with a trout weighing an ounce, won fourth prize, and fifth place went to David Godin of Schreiber, Ont., another ounce behind. Clark, fishing in Lake Nipigon, used an Eppinger Small Dardevil. Godin used live bait in Vaughn Lake.

Northern Pike — 35 lbs., Sept. 5 in Lake Baskatong, Que., with a Plueger Buffalo No. 7 spoon. Fred Turnbull of Edmonton, using perch for bait, caught a pike of 32 lbs. in Alberta's Jack Fish Lake to win third prize. H.I. Moffat of Yorkton, Sask., won an honorable mention. His pike, 24 lbs. 14 oz., was caught in Crooked Lake, Sask.

Chambers, Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., caught a 7 lb.-1 oz. trout in St. Mary's River, Ont., with a homemade bucktail, and took 10th place.

Rainbow trout (open — eastern division) — 17 lbs. 9 oz., Big Manistee River, Mich., on a Helin Flatfish. Best Canadian showing was an honorable mention for J.L. Armstrong of Fort William, who caught a trout of 10 lbs. 4 oz. in Lake Superior.

Brown trout (fly-casting) — 19 lbs. 10 1/2 oz., Proto River, Utah, on a Black Barberpole No. 6 fly. Rufus R. Payne of Peterborough, Ont., was given honorable mention. He caught a fish of 7 lbs. 2 oz. at Mill Brook, Ont.

Brown trout (open) — 20 lbs., Truckee River, Nev.

Large-mouth black bass (northern division) — 14 lbs., Round Valley Lake, Calif.; (southern division) — 13 lbs. 2 oz., Billy's Lake, Ga.; (Florida division) — 18 lbs. 4 oz., St. Johns River, Fla.

Small-mouth black bass — 12 lbs. 10 oz., Simmons Lake, Fla.

Ontario lakes and rivers provided 18 of the 20 top fish in the brook-trout contests. They came from Nipigon Lake and River, Bravet River, Lake Jo-Bam, Goulis River and Vaughn Lake.

Prize winning Northern Pike were caught in Separation Lake, Pickering Arm Lake, Nimitaki Lake, Lac Seul, Lac Lauzon, and Lake Jack Fish Lake, Alta., and Lake Baskatong, Que.

Six of the 10 biggest lake trout came from Lake Superior, the others from Lake Anishnab, Rossport, Ont., and Lake Mamegawess, Ont.

Biggest Canada-caught rainbow trout weighed 8 lbs. 16 oz. and came from Mira Lake, Alta. Other winners were caught in St. Mary's Rapids, Ont., and St. Mary's River, Ont.

Field and Stream's second-biggest muskellunge — 50 lbs. even — was from Rhone Lake, Ont., fourth-biggest from the Pickering River and 10th-biggest from Shoal Lake, Ont.

Portage Lake, Ont., provided an 18 lbs. 3-oz. wall-eyed pike, the winner of second prize. Others among the first 10 came from Evelyn Lake, Parry Sound, Big Sand Lake and Net Lake, Ont.

Junior hockey championship.

The team which will play here on Friday night against P. W. C. will be either the Sackville Junior Legion squad or the Saint John Junior Maroons, depending on who won the round at Saint John last night for the N. B. title. In all likelihood it will be the Sackville Juniors, as they went into last night's game with a three-goal advantage as the result of their 5-2 victory over Saint John at the Sackville Gardens on Monday night in the first game of their total-goal, home and home series.

As this column was written previous to the outcome of the final game, it was therefore impossible to state the team who would play here, although the result of that game will probably be found elsewhere on the sport page of this same issue.

The second and final game in the Island juvenile hockey series which was to be played at Kensington Rink last night between the Charlottetown Victorias and the Summerside Juniors, was postponed until Friday night due to the present snow-storm which has blocked the roads. The postponed game will be played at the Crystal Arena at Summerside instead of Kensington.

League officials announced yesterday that, due to the fact that the Borden Juniors, who were scheduled to meet the winners in the final round, have withdrawn from competition, instead of Friday night's juvenile game being a semi-final series it will now be the final round for the Island juvenile hockey championship.

Due to their 5-1 victory over the Summerside Juniors here Monday night in the first game of their total-goal, home and home series, the Vics are in a very good position for winning the championship, and although the Western boys have the advantage of playing the final game on their home ice, the Vics have a four-goal advantage to carry with them into the game, which is a big obstacle for any team to overcome at the best of times.

## Promises To Stage Biggest Prize Fight

LONDON, March 2 — (CP) — Boxing promoter Jack Solomons promised today to stage the biggest fight in history — with 150,000 spectators — as the London version of the next world heavyweight title scrap.

Solomons said he would hold the bout outdoors in Hyde Park, located in the centre of London, next September unless the government disapproves.

The idea, Solomons said, came to him during the night as he tossed in bed thinking about the international promotional struggle touched off Tuesday by Joe Louis' resignation as world champion.

His fighters would be Lee Savold of Paterson, N.J., who is under contract to him, and the winner of the June 2 bout here between Bruce Woodcock, British, Empire and European heavyweight champion, and Freddie Mills, world light-heavyweight titleholder.

"Why should two Americans fight for the title?" asked Solomons.

"All along I have contended that America, having more fighters than we do in Europe, should call their best the 'American champion,' not the champion of the world. Their best should always be pitted against the best in Europe for the world championship."

Solomons has asked for an interview with Charles Key, Minister of Works, so that he may appeal personally for the use of Hyde Park.

There was no immediate hint of how the government would react. There are obstacles to the use of Hyde Park which might, defy lesser men—but not Solomons, who sells fish from Billingsgate by day, promotes fights by night and is a licensed bookmaker on the side.

The park is a royal acreage which supplies the front lawn for some of London's swankiest hotels. Technically, Hyde Park belongs to the King, but Key administers it. No professional boxing ever has been tried there. An act of Parliament forbids anyone to make money from a public show in a royal park. Nevertheless, a spokesman for the Minister said Solomons' application would be considered.
