



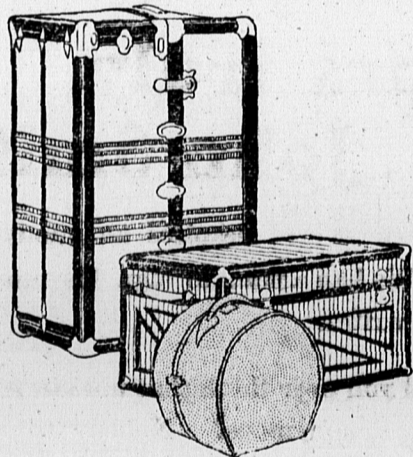

—SMUGGLED LIQUOR.— Miminogash seems to be the resting place of the prohibition and customs officers. On Monday at the County Court in Summerside before Judge McQuarrie 2 men from Miminogash were each fined \$150, and costs for having smuggled liquor in their possession. Early yesterday morning prohibition inspectors Barbour and Haywood, and customs officers Hardy and Cople paid another visit to Miminogash. They were enjoying a sail off the shore of Miminogash when they came upon a motor boat at anchor which contained three men who were dozing. The officers boarded the boat and found three cases of French brandy, a keg of rum and some whiskey. The boat and contents were seized. The three men were arraigned yesterday and one man who was fined last week was convicted of a second offence and was fined two hundred dollars to be paid in installments. The second man was convicted of a first offence and fined \$150 or 6 months in jail. The third member of the trio who just happened to be with the other two was fined \$50 or 3 months in jail.
