NEARLY ALL SOLD - Mr. J. E. Newsom, of the firm of Messrs Newsom and McLeod, wholesale merchants, Boston, arrived in Charlottetown by the express last night. Mr. Newsom is Secretary Treasurer of the Massachusetts Silver Black Fox Company, and comes here on business connected with his company. This is another company, the shares of which have almost all been bought by United States capitalists. The ranch is one of the largest on the Island and stock has practically all been disposed of.

A PARTRIDGE STORY - Many sportsmen throughout the Island on Thanksgiving Day took the opportunity afforded by the holiday of having a pop at the partridges, the season for shooting which is now on, the birds being reported plentiful. But they are evidently not so plentiful as this tale, which will no doubt be enjoyed by all gunsmen. Among those who went out after the partridges on Monday were two ardent, but very young and very green sportsmen from the city. Tell it not in Gath, publish it not in Ascalon, it was their very first attempt at such a thing. Neither had on any occasion before handled, far less used, a shot gun. This story, however, is not concerned with any consequences resulting from their foolhardiness in venturing on such an expedition by themselves. Foolhardy it was of course, as either was just as liable in such circumstances to get shot as the partridges, a statement that the story bears out. With plenty of enthusiasm the young men set out after the game at an early hour in the morning; they returned late in the evening, with their guns and their empty cartridge shells, with the cap of each filled with shot holes, but both minus anything like a partridge, or other bird for that matter. Shamefacedly, the weaker of the two confessed that after a weary day of tramping and shooting at birds that never seemed to be in the same position when he pulled the trigger as when he aimed, they had both got down to their last cartridge when they espied a solitary partridge at the same time. Up went both guns, one on each side of the bird, and the reports of the discharged pieces were simultaneous. To their great surprise and delight the bird dropped, dead. Each stoutly claimed the honor of having brought it down. To settle the dispute which promised at one time to wax warm, it was agreed to examine the bird and determine from the position of the shot marks in its body whom marksmanship had caused its death. They did so and found - not a single shot hole in the body anywhere. Indignant they left the dead bird where it lay. As to what caused the partridge's death there is no explanation. The sad side about the story for these young shots is that before setting out on their day's hunt, each had promised at least half a dozen persons to bring back a bird for each of them. Up to the present they have avoided explanations. But Nemesis is on their heels.

Just think, the highest temperature recorded in this city this week was 43 and the lowest was 20, fourteen below freezing point. I guess with the same temperature back home fur coats would be in evidence."

ENGAGES LADIES FOR ORCHESTRA.

LONDON, Oct. 20 - Sir Henry Wood, director and conductor of the Queen's Hall orchestra for symphony concerts, has broken all English precedents by engaging four women violinists and two women viola players for the forthcoming season. Sir Henry says: "For years I have felt that women were being unfairly treated by the orchestral world. There are hundreds of exceptionally talented women violinists without any professional outlet for their genius. The violin is woman's ideal musical instrument and the average cultured woman violinist is superior to the average man. What is more important, the average woman musician is much more enthusiastic than the average man. The women in my orchestra will be paid the same amount as the men. My chief hope is that every other professional orchestra will follow the lead we have taken."
