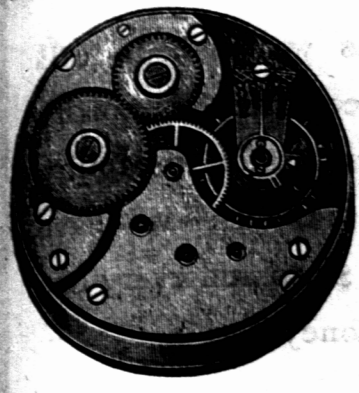

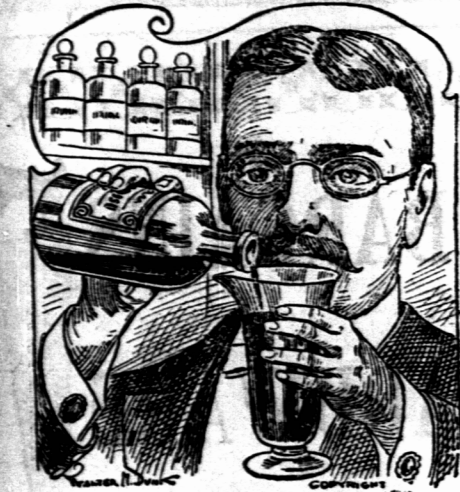

## ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

### Reporters and Correspondents Everywhere.

John Collins yesterday paid his fine of \$100.

The Halifax is expected to arrive about nine this morning.

Yesterday Mrs. Annie Coyle paid her fine of \$200 for second violation of the Prohibition Act.

The S. S. Loughburg of the Black Diamond Line is due here this morning from Sydney with a cargo of 2500 tons of reserve run of mine coal for Peake Bros.

All the factories on the island have ceased cheese making. About one half have entered upon the manufacture of butter. This, however, is a smaller percentage than last season.

In front of the City Building yesterday afternoon Inspector Norman Campbell destroyed a quantity of whiskey, rum and brandy to the value of \$100. The liquor was seized some time ago from Esmet McGilgan, bartender at Angus McDonald's and from Thomas McNulty.

The Coban arrived yesterday at eight o'clock with a large cargo of general merchandise. She leaves again at day-break with one of the largest cargoes of the season including 3000 bags cats, 250 bbs of pork and meat, 400 tubs butter, 78 boxes butter, 300 boxes cheese, 400 bbs vegetables, 500 bags vegetables, 220 sheep, 84 bbs oysters and 16 head of cattle. This is her last trip this season.

REV. D. B. McDonald's estate in Souris has been sold as follows:—Factory Farm, Souris Luce Road, 48 acres sold to Thomas Kichham, Souris West for \$910. Farm in Lot 45 near Souris railway station, 29 acres for \$950 to St. Mary's parish; Two town lots, Souris, A. L. Fraser, Souris for \$250; Town lot, Main St., Mrs. Williams \$110; Farm near Blake Pond 27 acres, James Gardiner for \$80.

FOUR Prohibition cases were up before the magistrate at the Police Court yesterday morning. John Collins for first offence was fined \$100 and costs, the cases against Mary Carroll and Elma Downing were adjourned till Saturday and the case against Edward Collins was dismissed. The following drunks were disposed of: Charles Burns \$2.00 or ten days; William McDeirmid, \$2 or 10 days; Edgar McCarron, \$2 or 10 days; John Donovan, \$5 or 30 days; Francis Began \$5 or 30 days; James Power \$5 or 30 days. Burns, Donovan, and Power who were out on bail did not appear. Edward McCarron is the man who was attacked some time ago on Lower Queen Street by the Chipman Brothers.

A SUMMONS returnable on Saturday has been served for perjury on Eimund Chandler, Mount Albion who has recently been so prominent in the Prohibition cases at the Police Court. The complainant is John Collins a well known liquor seller of this city and the offence is alleged to have been committed in the trial of Isaac Brown, Millview before Stipendiary Magistrate Palmer last Friday. The information alleges that Chandler committed the perjury by swearing in effect "I am not paid for informing. Never got reward for staying away in the Gregory case. Never got a promise. Never went to see Seymour Gregory for money after staying away. Was not paid any money for not convicting Offer or Benoit at any time." A. J. B. Mellish is acting for the prosecution.

THE Hon. Mr. Prefontaine will not get away on his tour of inspection throughout the maritime provinces before next week. He will be accompanied by his colleague, the minister of finance, and will take time enough to familiarize himself with the questions coming for his attention in all three provinces. The rearrangements between the public works and marine and fisheries departments, which is to add to the importance of the latter portfolio, will not take place till after Mr. Prefontaine returns. The legislation which passed parliament in this connection was of a very general character and the changes themselves will depend a good deal on whether Mr. Prefontaine is to remain in the department of marine and fisheries or to be moved across to the department of public works.—Montreal Witness.

Now that we got our station there still remains the fact that the trains are run on the C. T. branch at the most injudicious hours possible, and we earnestly hope for and expect to see some improvements along these lines. We have surely had enough of night service.

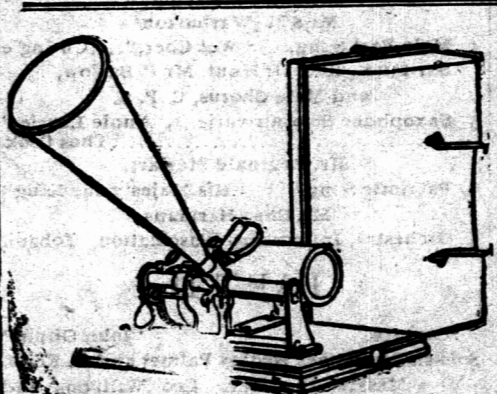

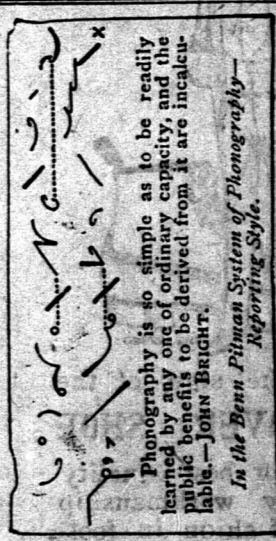
