Assembly president and secretary-general by the United States, Britain and France.

These notes, replying to last Saturday's appeal by Lie and Ewart for four-power Berlin peace talks, said the Berlin situation is still a threat to peace and must remain in the hands of the Security Council under present circumstances.

The new Lie-Ewart plea carries a significant shift in emphasis. In the original appeal the stress was placed on possible four-power talks; today's appeal, the two leaders urged the big power to note "in particular" the part of the earlier Lie-Ewart letter calling on them to "lend their full and active support to the efforts at mediation of the Berlin dispute by the president of the Security Council."

One neutral source said the new Lie-Ewart statement apparently indicated the two leaders had accepted the Western view that the Berlin conflict should remain in the Security Council.

A United Nations source said Lie and Ewart expected no formal answer to their appeal.

The reduction in price guarantee may force American prices down to a level where it could possibly be equal to Canadian prices.

This would mean that Canadian exporters may have to accept less for the product than obtained before today's move.

On the other hand, reduction in American production will make American growers less hostile to Canadian imports.

Since they will have less potatoes to sell, said the potato expert, and with American markets remaining steady, they will be less worried about Canadian potatoes "flooding" the American market.

Maine Comment

PRESQUE ISLE, Me., Nov. 17 - (AP) - Maine's potato growers tonight greeted the news of the Agriculture Department's price support slash with general approval.

Some smaller firms said they were pleased by the drastic acreage cut. Harold E. Bryant, general manager of the Maine Potato Growers Association, termed Agriculture Secretary Charles Brannan's move "a step in the right direction."

Maine produces about a seventh of the country's spuds. Ninety per cent of the Maine crop is grown in Aroostook county. Presque Isle is the county's chief shipping centre.

Down near Chatham, Windsor and St. John's, Windsor, signs were torn from their moorings by a steady, 50-mile-an-hour blast. No one was reported hurt.

Worst In 15 Years

VICTORIA, Nov. 17 - (CP) - British Columbia's battered west coast, storm-swept from the Juan de Fuca Strait to the northern Queen Charlotte Islands, shook itself today from its worst blow in 15 years and prepared to face another.

The Weather Office here reported in its synopsis late today "the third violent storm in five days is expected to reach the B. C. coast late tonight."

The report said southeasterly gale warnings have been issued for all waters adjacent to the Charlottes as well as for the west and north coast of Vancouver Island.

Tonight's warning of another blast follows close after near-cyclonic gales which swept the coastal waters during yesterday and last night, bringing death to seven persons, and a property damage toll which may run into hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Ruptured communications throughout the storm's path made assessment of the damage toll difficult.

Port Alberni and its sister community, Alberni were isolated when rock and dirt cut off its sole rail and wire communication with other Vancouver Island centres. An Esquimalt and Nanaimo passenger train was tied up on the rail, about 16 miles east of the Alberni, for eight hours during the night. Only mainland connection with the town today was by airline.

The lightship, Swiftsure, was swept from its moorings at the wharfery at the head of the Juan de Fuca Strait last night and 16 persons narrowly escaped death.

Worst marine disaster was the sinking of the 80-foot tug boat St. Clair, which broke up off Port Sanfrew, 50 miles south of Port Alberni. Three Vancouver men died in the mishap and six others escaped injury.

A Vancouver woman was lost overboard from a ferry en route from here to Victoria. Two Seattle seamen were missing and believed dead from a tug which sank in Puget Sound and the seventh casualty was a seaman who died of a heart attack during a rescue operation off the mouth of the Columbia River.

pearance to high-class platinum pelts. The breeders were old, established ranchers who had been winning prizes for years, many of them since the first show was inaugurated. Then, too, there were some young showmen who are fast making a reputation as breeders and who received a lot of encouragement because of the way their foxes hunted.

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The prize list below gives all the winners, with the exception of the classes which were judged on Tuesday, the results of which appeared in yesterday's paper.

Mink Exhibits

Mink judging was conducted at the same time as the fox judging, part of the table being reserved for them. A lot of interest was taken by spectators, both fox and mink farmers, anxious to see what constituted a good mink in the different types.

Judge Maloney made his decisions quickly but carefully, showing that his long period of service as grader with the famous Revellion Freres, had not been forgotten or his continued work in the same capacity with Hudson Bay Company. He gave good credit to the breeders for their exhibits, which he said were very creditable in the results of the show.

In conclusion he also mentioned the excellent facilities afforded by the judging room and the light of which could not be improved anywhere.

The greatest harmony and helpfulness prevailed among all the exhibitors and it can be safely said that mink farming is now established as a most worthy adjunct to fox farming.

Judge MacLeod who gave such concentrated attention to the foxes, stated that he was well pleased with the exhibits, saying that in his opinion they were judged on the exhibitors were to be congratulated on keeping the exhibition a going concern. Mr. MacLeod made a splendid job of it and his conscientious and hard work was greatly appreciated.

Due credit must be given to those who urged the holding of the show this year and among them must be classed as number one Ernest T. Mill. It was agreed that the fine show, a combination of the mink and fox, was not only here but elsewhere throughout the Dominion. If followed by a fox pelt show at Summerside, which last year was the largest ever held in the Dominion of Canada, there is certainly that further encouragement will result.

The pelt show, like the fox show, is held under the auspices of the Prince Edward Island Fur Breeders' Association, who conducted the mink show as well.

Great credit should be given to secretary Walter R. Shaw, who was called "superman" by many yesterday because of the organizational work and direction he gave to a fox and mink show conducted at the same time. To his clerical staff, who know their duties so well that mistakes never occur, and results are out quickly, must also be given many words of praise.
