LONDON, May 27—(Canadian Press Cable)—Britain intends to approach currency discussions at the Ottawa Imperial Economic Conference with a thoroughly open mind.

Hilton Young, Minister of Health, speaking for the Government in the House of Commons today, was frank in his statement that the Ottawa discussions were expected to cover the proposal of bringing silver into the currency picture. The problem of bi-metalism must be thrashed out before Britain began consideration of a fresh basis for her currency.

NEW FRUIT AND PRODUCE BUSINESS

Attention is called to the advertisement appearing in this morning's paper in which Mr. Paul A. Murray announces the opening of a new wholesale Fruit and Produce Warehouse in the premises formerly occupied by Clarke Bros. at No. 1 Prince Street.

Mr. Murray has associated with him, in an advisory capacity, Mr. Frank Clark, former owner and proprietor of Clarke Bros.
Having made a careful study of the most modern, economical methods of merchandising fruit, they have installed one of the most modern and up-to-date five ton York Self Contained Refrigeration Units of ample size to sufficiently control temperatures in various rooms. The method of refrigeration is direct expansion, using about two thousand feet of pipe, together with cork insulated rooms and cement plaster finish inside, also three ripening rooms for bananas which are equipped with electric heaters and electric refrigeration which means the bananas can be either ripened quickly or held firm ripe.

The refrigeration plant has been supplied by the Canadian Ice

Machine Co., Toronto, Ont., and installed by their engineer, Mr. John F. McCuspe, who also installed the plant at the Charlottetown Forum.

The fruit will arrive under refrigeration, go direct from the track spur to the electrically controlled refrigerator on the main floor, without being exposed to unfavorable weather conditions and without truckage.

The opening date will be June 15th.

For the past eight weeks Mr. Murray has handled large quantities of Island produce, potatoes and turnips, and in addition to car load lots, he has loaded at Victoria, a steamer load of twenty thousand ninety pound sacks of potatoes and fifteen thousand fifty pound sacks of turnips. This is the first steamer ever loaded in Prince Edward Island and shipped direct to Boston.

Many friends will join in wishing this enterprising firm every success in this new venture, and in their efforts to give our consumers finer and fresher fruit.

Honorary President At I. O. D. E. Opening

Mrs. C. E. Burden National President, Welcomes Her Excellency Who Thrills I. O. D. E. Members At National Chapter Opening.

TORONTO, May 27—Honored by the presence of Her Excellency the Countess of Bessborough, honorary president of the Order, the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire opened its 32nd annual meeting with brilliant ceremony in the Royal York Hotel Tuesday evening.

At a signal from the Guilders, who were assisting in the function, the guests who filled the concert hall stood and the procession of standard-bearers made their way up the centre aisle to place the Union Jacks as a bank at the back of the stage. They were led by the National Chapter standard, borne by Mrs. C. H. Wilson, representing Mrs. C. L. Bates of Saskatchewan. Then came the honorary national vice-president and the national officers, the guests including Mrs. George S. Henry, the Bishop of Niagara, Mr. Russell Nesbitt, representing the Premier of Ontario; Controller Robbins, representing the Mayor.

Her Excellency had been met no arrival at the hotel by Mrs. C. L. Burden and a group including Miss Church and Mrs. George Dunbar, Capt. Stuart French, A.D.C., and Mrs. Gordon-Ives were in attendance. The honored party concluded the procession, walking beside Her Excellency. Her Excellency, who was referred to as "a vice-queen after their own heart," was an exquisitely stately figure, gowned in white net with embroidered white silk coin spots, wearing a diamond

tiara and three ropes of pearls.
Mrs. C. E. Burden was in white broadcloth with diamond necklace and earrings. The national standard bearer was wearing plain ivory satin, and the gowns of the others on the platform lent beauty and color to the scene.

Following the national anthem, and invocation by the Bishop of Niagara, Lady Bessborough was officially welcomed by the president. Her Excellency then spoke briefly of her pleasure in attending. She expressed herself as deeply impressed by the motto of the Order and by the work by which it was upheld. She had been struck, since her arrival in the Dominion, by the energy of Canadian women in activities for the good of their country. Greetings were read from the Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett and from Sir William Mulock, administrator of the province. Mr. Russell Nesbitt, M.P.P., speaking on behalf of the Hon. George S. Henry, noted that Ontario was a province whose population was imbued with the colonial spirit of imperialism. He felt that the I.O.D.E. represented Canadian womanhood at its best, as women of thought and culture. He reminded that their imperialism meant Empire unity, Empire action, Empire trade.

Controller Robbins, in his civic greeting, spoke of Toronto as a city loving British institutions. Canada, he felt, had been fortunate in her governors-general. There were some who wanted a change in Canada's

connections. He hoped this might never be, but that the connection might go on "just as it is." Mrs. W. G. Lumbers brought greetings as regent of the municipal Chapter, and response on behalf of the convention was made by Mrs. G. E. Knechtel, national organizing secretary, of Edmonton.

The presidential address was the main feature of the evening. In it, Mrs. C. E. Burden called for gallant courage, good sense and good humor in meeting the questions of the day; outlined what the Order was doing to make the better type of Imperial citizens; reminded that service to the country must have the long view, that "we must enlist 'for duration,' set into training for a long period of work." Here, she said, she pinned her faith on the younger generation. She hoped that Canada, in the coming Imperial Conference, would take the long view, that there might be no penny-wise pound foolish attitude.

Imperial Acts

Mrs. Burden then noted some of the ways in which the I.O.D.E. worked towards its imperialism. About \$110,000 had been spent in the past year on child welfare and relief, and large sums on education, with the conviction that the under-privileged child was less fitted to become the best citizen. In all, \$350,000 had been raised in the name of the I.O.D.E. in the year, but only one-third of this had gone strictly to I.O.D.E. activities, the remainder going to other institutions aided by the order. In noting the extent of the order's influence, Mrs. Burden referred to a chapter in a totem pole village on the west coast, to work in India and to five new chapters organized in the Peace River district.

Mentioning Empire Day and Victoria Day, the speaker said that if the Board of Education ever dropped the customary activities of Empire Day, this would be a regrettable step, which opinion met with applause. Mrs. Burden stressed the fact that every luxury and necessity for the home could be supplied by Empire products, and urged members to buy such. The present times were indicated for giving, helping those less fortunate, and spending, not hoarding. The president drew attention to the words of "O Canada" endorsed by the order as suitable to Imperial Canadians.
