FUR-BEARING MENAGERIE

A Prince Edward Island company is interested, says a Calgary exchange, in the idea of beautifying Banff and affording exceptional attractions to tourists, thus adding to the worth of the town and surroundings as a resort for tourists all over the world. A representative called at the city hall Friday afternoon and received information regarding Banff, and regarding the proper parties to see in the resort with respect to a proposition his principals intend to make, and it is altogether probable that in the near future an animal farm will be started in that place.

The idea consists in a menagerie of fur-bearing animals that will be kept at Banff both as an attraction and a money-making proposition. The animals would consist of fur-bearing animals, including the beaver, the mink, the fox, the muskrat, the coon, the buffalo, the sable, the bear, the leopard, the karakule sheep, and other animals that would make up an excellent menagerie and that could be raised in such numbers that their skins would bring the company a huge profit.

The company have farms in the east and these are enclosed in large areas, with all the animals placed in sections modeled after their actual homes and all true to nature. The wilder animals are placed in cages and the entire year around the menagerie is open to sight-seers for a very reasonable price. Such farms add to the attractive features of the resort and place before the travelling public, animals, native to Canada, that they would not be able to see otherwise.

THREE YEARS RETENTION PERIOD IN THE FRENCH ARMY

PARIS, May 15.—The French premier, Louis Barthou, declared in the chamber that the retention of the three years time expired soldiers in the French army was urgent and inevitable in consequence of the European situation. He made this statement in reply to questions by Deputy Antoine Durafour and Piesre Brizon, who asked whether if it was necessary to keep the men with the colors for another year. The premier

said the government took the fullest responsibility for this action. The premier's declaration was followed by an animated debate in the chamber of deputies. Deputy Durafour alluded to what he termed the audacity of the premier in using bellicose language in a speech at Gaen two weeks ago.
