The High School at Souris West, and the schools at Mt. Stewart, were inspected last week by inspector McCormac. Mr. McCormac reports a great amount of sickness among the school children, and as a consequence a very poor attendance in the schools.

Wild geese are very scarce in Morell this season and very few have been shot. A local sportsman got a bird scarce last week, when he heard rifle bullets zip-zip past him on the ice. It seems some one on the other side of the bay has a military rifle and if he is not more careful a serious accident may some day be reported.

The breakwater completed at Morell last fall is as solid as a rock and is sanded on the other side almost to the end. The work promises to be good for the harbor and reflects credit on the builder in charge, Kemble Webster. Knowing ones say that 500 feet more of the same kind of work would make an A. 1. Harbor.

A BIG BLIZZARD

TORONTO, April 8 - A storm which developed yesterday afternoon caused an immense amount of damage throughout Ontario and the West. A regular blizzard prevailed, destroying lines of communication, blowing down buildings and resulting in serious injury to many persons.

At London, a chimney on the Aberdeen School crashed through the building, burying three hundred children under the debris. The Fire Department was called out and although the wildest panic prevailed, all the children were rescued, only five being injured - one of these may die.

Every city in Western Ontario reports buildings blown down or unroofed, while falling chimneys made walking very dangerous.

In Toronto, an aged woman was lifted bodily by the wind and hurled against a wagon, being badly injured. A plank blown from a load of lumber seriously hurt a pedestrian.

At Guelph, the front was blown out of St. Patrick's School, and many persons narrowly escaped injury.

In Buffalo, one man was killed and cores hurt by the falling debris, while the property damage is immense.

MORE ABOUT FLOOD TORONTO, April 10. - The Niagara River went on the great ice fields in Lake Erie sent millions of tons of ice over the falls. The water in the lower river rose twenty-five feet, submerging the George Electric Road under fifteen feet of water and sweeping the poles and wires, with much of the railroad away. Everything movable in the lower river is being carried into Lake Erie. Two guy wires of the suspension bridge were carried away. The flood is the greatest in sixty years.

TWO BOYS SAD DEATH. MONTREAL, April 10. - On the way from church Joseph McDonald and Joseph Limerick, two boys, passed behind a street car on Mount Royal Avenue. The car was suddenly backed up and the boys were crushed to death beneath its wheels. No one saw the accident the bodies being found lying mangled upon the track.
