

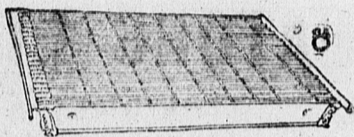

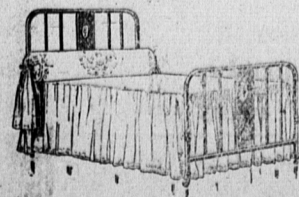
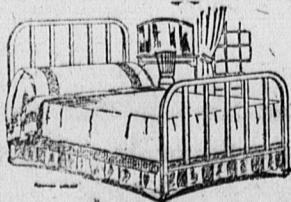

**"Ideals" Subject of Sermon**

MONTREAL, March 7.—That a man was finer in himself and a greater asset to his country for being a follower of Christ, was a belief of Father Nicholas Higgins as expressed in his sermon at St. Patrick's, delivered at High Mass at 11 o'clock, the edifice being thronged by a very large congregation. Through men may be good without religion, they were losing much, they would be a hundred times better with religion, was another belief stated by the preacher.

Father Higgins is a Friar of the English Province of the Capuchin Franciscans of London. He began yesterday a series of lectures which will extend over six Sundays, both at the High Mass and the evening service.

During this week he will also conduct a four-day retreat for the three hundred Catholic students of McGill University.

The distinguished preacher is a very telling pulpit orator, both by choice of language and delightful imagery.

"Ideals" was the subject of the introductory sermon. Do not be carried away by picturesque sayings, said Father Higgins, such as: "Believe me, there's more faith in honest doubt than in half the creeds." Religion was not a mere belief, it was an endeavor on the part of man to recognize his God, and to follow. The atheist or the materialist may think they can improve on the teachings of Christ, but they have failed to give what all men need, an ideal. Prepare the funeral robes for a man without an ideal. To Messrs C. M. Lampson & Company, London, from Prince Edward Island by Registered Mail or Express

Silver Fox intended for Messrs. C. M. Lampson & Company's London Sales should be shipped by Registered Mail, and packed in parcels weighing not over 4 lbs. 6 ozs. or by Express, if more convenient.

If shipped by Registered Mail, the outer covering should be of unbleached muslin or similar material and the following address should be plainly marked on the outside of the package: C. M. Lampson & Company, 64 Queen Street, London, E. C. 1, England.

In addition, the shipper's name and address should be placed on the outside of the package, to enable Messrs. Lampson & Company to identify the package upon arrival, and packages should be numbered consecutively from No. 1 upwards.

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If insurance under the terms of Messrs. Lampson & Company's open policies is desired, the above instructions should be carefully followed and a letter of advice should be sent to Alfred Fraser, 212 Fifth Avenue, New York, N. Y., stating the number of package shipped, the number of skins in each package and the amount of insurance desired on each package, and the Post Office receipt or Express receipt must accompany the letter of advice. 909-1-12-11.

age approaches we are said to have one foot in the grave; when we lose our ideals we have one foot in hell. No man is an absolute failure until he goes to hell; still, let him go through life without aspirations and ambitions and he is on the high road. If you have lost your visions of possible excellence, do not ever again speak of the tragedies of the Great War, or loss of the family support, lament the tragedy of your own life.

The preacher spoke of the wonderful works of the old artist, who were inspired by ideals, but he made a distinction between ideals possible and impossible. If a man has no gift of poetry, the Lord deliver us from his verses; if a woman has no music or voice, the Lord deliver us from her song. The old Latin poet told of the danger of trying to attain the possible in the story of Icarus, who with his wings of feathers and wax flew too high. But the ideals of Christianity are possible. They do not demand a literal reproduction of Jesus as he walked the highways of Galilee and Judea, but each one is called to reproduce Christ in his own particular sphere of activity; this is to think and speak and act as Christ would think, and speak and act in that mode of life. What, then, is to prevent a man from being another Christ in the office, in the workshop, in the streets, in the home, in the club, in the places of recreation and in all his dealings with his fellows?

MONUMENT OF PARLIAMENTARIAN

A very fine figure in bronze, a statue portrait of Lieut.-Col. George Harold Baker, M. P., has just been unveiled at the Parliament Buildings, Ottawa. Col. Baker was the first Parliamentarian to lose his life in the Great War. His death occurred in action at Sactuary Wood, June 2, 1916, when he was a serving under Lord Byng. It was Lord Byng who unveiled the monument at Ottawa. The picture shows the bronze figure, and also the position it occupies in a bay of the east aisle of the main entrance to the House of Commons.
