Jane Azoff Lowers Saint Stephen Track Mark

Goes Final Mile In 2.07; Collision In Free-for-all Features Final Day's Racing

ST. STEPHEN, N.B., Aug. 21—(CP)—Jane Azoff, former Grand Circuit performer, now owned by C. H. Houston, Murray River, P.E.I., broke the track record in the final day's racing at St. Stephen Exhibition today, clipping two seconds off the 2:08 mark in the third heat of the free-for-all. The time was 2:07. In the first heat the slow time of 2:24 was registered by the Azoff mare, which took all three races. The stakes for the other two horses, Walter Brown and All Grattan, collided and both drivers were thrown to the track but were unhurt. The Grattan horse kept going without a driver and Kelly had to slow down in the heat in order not to collide with the Saint John horse, owned by Cecil M. Alexander. The new system of dash racing was used today and proved successful with the horses changing positions for every heat.

Chicago Cubs Snap Brooklyn Streak At Six Straight

BROOKLYN, Aug. 21—(AP)—Chicago Cubs up-ended Brooklyn Dodgers 6-2 today in a turbulent National League struggle interrupted by numerous arguments, two of which brought about the banishment of Managers Leo Durocher and Johnny Wilson. Durocher, in fact, was waved out of the game twice to win some sort of a personal prize for tenacity. He was ejected at the start of the third inning for continued protests of a ball called in the first inning. In the seventh the umpires discovered he still was standing in the stairway leading into the Dodger dugout and promptly gaily directing his team. This time they forced him on to the dressing room. Wilson was ousted in the sixth for protesting that a batted ball which was called foul had landed fair.

From the first inning on there never was much question that Brooklyn's seven-game winning streak would be snapped. Little Jake M. pitched steady, seven-hit ball and, except for the fourth inning, held the Brooklyn record steady. Stan Hack and Phil Cavaretta, blasted 13 hits of four Dodger hurlers, including Whitlow Wyatt, who was called upon for his first relief performance of the year. At Boston, Bucky Walters collected his 16th victory of the season and gave Cincinnati Reds their 11th triumph in the last 12 starts as they defeated Braves 8-5.

The Reds hopped on starter Bill Poedel in the opening inning, belting home two tallies on Eddie Joost's single, Mike McCormick's double, Jimmy Gleeson's long fly and a single by Lonnie Frey. They put the game beyond recall with a four-run third inning at the expense of their former teammate, Johnny Hutchings. Three of the runs were unearned, coming after Buddy Hassett dropped a good throw from Al Roberge for what would have been the final out.

CROP REPORT

MONCTON N. B., Aug. 19—Heavy and continuous rainy weather caused serious interruption in the harvesting of hay in the South and Southeast of New Brunswick, Central and south section of Prince Edward Island and the Northern counties of Nova Scotia and Cape Breton, states J. E. McIntyre, Agricultural Agent of the Canadian National Railways here, reporting on the crop situation in the Maritime Provinces. Continuing, he said "considerable loss in quality was experienced both from late cutting and exposure to weather. On the aggregate, however the hay crop in the Maritimes can be considered fair yield. Practically no grain has been harvested to date with the exception of some barley, as most of the grain crops were put in late. The entire crop situation in western Nova Scotia and the North Western part of New Brunswick is considered very favorable."

In the wet areas he advises farmers growing potatoes should watch carefully for late blight and be prepared to spray with the regular bordeaux mixture and keep the vines well covered until maturity. The pasture situation, on the other hand, has been excellent all over the Maritimes, as a matter of fact, the best in many years, and this, as stated, is confirmed by an increase in milk production for July over the preceding year by 8 per cent to 10 per cent. Fertilized pastures have done exceedingly well and have proven quite definitely the economic value of top dressing with fertilizers, he concluded.

MacPhail names Six most Valuable Dodgers

NEW YORK, Aug. 21—(AP)—Six players, none of whom were with the Dodgers on June 1, 1940, are responsible for Brooklyn leading the National League, says Leonard Stanford MacPhail, the talkative President of the club. "The most valuable men on our ball club this season have been Mickey Owen, Kirby Hoge, Curt Davis, Pete Reiser, Bill Herman and Joe Medwick," he observed today. "I'm not naming them in any kind of order, but these are the men who have carried us to the top. Without them we wouldn't be anywhere else, yet not one of them was on this club June 1 last year. "Herman, Owen and Reiser kept us going in the early part of the season when some of the other men weren't living up to their reputations and in recent weeks we have been getting a great lift from the other three. "I've been watching Medwick play ball for 10 years and never in all that time have I seen him hustle the way he is doing now for us. Even in his early days with the Cardinals he never played any better outfield than he is doing right now. "I'd like to know where Herman got his reputation as a trouble-maker, while we're about it. He's really made our ball club and he's well liked by all the other players."

Feller Whitewashes Yanks To Clip Losing Streak

CLEVELAND, Aug. 21—(AP)—Victory No. 21 finally popped up for Bob Feller today, the 21st of August, as the talented righthander shut out New York Yankees on seven hits for a 2-0 Cleveland triumph.

Feller's fine performance brought the Indians their first victory in 10 games and held the American League leaders scoreless for the second straight day. Rapid Robert had won only one other game in more than a month and he was given a run for his money today by Aley Donald, a pitcher who had whipped him twice in previous encounters. Donald allowed the Indians only eight hits in this struggle. Manager Roger Peckinpaugh shook up his lineup and obtained results in the first inning. Russ Peters drew a walk, Roy Weatherly tripped and Jeff Heath singled for the only runs of the game. From then on Feller and Donald waged a bitter mound duel, with Feller fanning nine and walking only two men.

At Chicago, Boston Red Sox ended White Sox winning streak at nine games and also put a stop to a run of 32 consecutive shutout innings by Chicago hurlers, Boston won 8-5. Ted Williams broke the shutout string in the second inning when he scored on a wild pitch. The Red Sox went on to tally three more runs in that frame. Bradman is 32 and might have obtained even greater heights than those he reached in his 14 years as a first class player.
