Canadian Press Writer Assigned To C. A. S. F.

OTTAWA, Oct. 24—(CP)—Action of the Canadian Active Service Force in France will be reported by a Canadian Press staff writer corresponding, W. Rupert Davies, President, today told the semi-annual meeting of the board of directors of the Canadian Press.

Mr. Davies, who made a three-week tour of Central European capitals immediately before the outbreak of war, said that Canadian newspapers were being provided with the most complete news coverage on the war available to any group of newspapers in the world. In addition to the output of the Canadian Press, London Bureau there were available for use the reports of the Associated Press, Reuters, Havas News Agency and the Press Association, co-operative news body of the United Kingdom newspapers.

The two-day meeting of directors discussed business of the Association, including the matter of increased costs due to covering of war news.

In connection with the service of 15-minute radio news bulletins provided without charge to the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation for use across Canada three times daily and once at night, the board expressed its appreciation of the assurance of Major Gladstone Murray, C. B. General Manager, that these bulletins would be made available to all radio stations in Canada.

J. A. McNeil, General Manager expressed appreciation of the "most reasonable and accommodating" attitude shown by W. S. Thomson, Chairman of the Censorship Commission, in dealing with various matters arising between him and the newspaper.

The next divisional meeting of the Maritime members of the Canadian Press was set for Halifax Nov. 2.

No Charges Laid In N. B. Hit And Run

FREDERICTON, Oct. 24—No charge has been laid against R. Kenneth Ackman following his arrest today. Town Marshal Leo P. Hayes of Devon said tonight. Before the arrest Ackman, a veteran of the old New Brunswick provincial police force and a member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police since 1932, "made a statement" concerning an alleged hit-and-run fatality last night, said Hayes.

R. C. M. P. officials said today that Ackman would be turned over to authorities at Devon. Hayes said tonight that no further developments were probable until after an inquest Thursday night into the death of Myron Hazelwood, 25 unemployed and father of three children.

Struck while riding a bicycle at South Devon, Hazelwood died en route to hospital. Ackman voluntarily made a statement today while police were still searching for the car involved, said Hayes. Later an R. C. M. P. car was found in a garage here and showed signs of recent damage, although repairs had been made on it, he added. A headlight rim found near the accident scene was identified as belonging to the same model of car as the police automobile.
