MOTHS IN TRUNKS AND CLOSETS

It frequently happens that, in spite of care, moths are discovered in the midst of the summer in trunks or closets supposed to have been well impregnated with preventives that their entrance would have been impossible. They hide in the crevices, and many attempts to dislodge them are futile.

A simple and effectual plan is to heat stove lids or an iron shovel red-hot, pour vinegar upon the iron, and let the fumes penetrate the cracks which could not be reached with a powder gun.

Moths are particularly fond of new plaster, and the settling of the walls of new houses affords them numberless hiding places which cannot well be reached except by fumigation.

Burning sulphur is excellent for ridding walls of any sort of vermin, but the fumes of this are objectionable to many, and they do not pass off so quickly as those of vinegar.

OF SPECIAL INTEREST

BERLIN, May 1 (Special).—A warning that an attempt was to be made on the life of Emperor William on his journey to Karlsruhe, in the Grand Duchy of Baden, was received by the police authorities in Berlin anonymously from abroad. They immediately informed the police of Karlsruhe and Frankfurt, and most stringent precautions were taken to prevent any outrage.

ALBANY, N. Y., April 29 (Special).—The Assembly Rules Committee reported the bill recommended by Secretary of State May amended so as to provide for the licensing of all operators of motor vehicles, without examination or fee, and authorizing the Secretary of State to revoke or suspend licenses for cause, after a hearing, subject to a review by the courts.

No change has been made in the present license fee for owners of automobiles.

CROSSES FOR SERVANTS

German Empress's Rewards for Long Service

The German Empress has embarked enthusiastically on the encouragement of long and faithful service by cooks, housemaids and children's nurses. She has distributed nearly two hundred gold crosses to servants who have been in the same family over forty years.

Accompanying the gold cross is an illuminated document, which ends up with the quotation, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant!"

A pathetic story is told of an old nurse in Silesia who served in one family 28 years and brought up two generations of children. The nurse had been hoping that she would serve long enough to earn the gold cross.

When two years short of the necessary term she got ill and was expected to die. She wrote to the Empress telling her story, and saying that the one disappointment in her life was that she could not earn the cross. Three days later she died. On the morning of her funeral a letter came from the Empress, sending the cross.

The distributors of a charity failed to find a single poor person in the village of Langwm, Pembrokeshire. On the contrary, every resident is a tree-holder.

"MAK' IT PILLS"

How a Shrewd Doctor Knew His Patient Was a Miser

Curious habits of the Aberdeen miser, George Anderson, were described in the Court of Session, Edinburgh, during the hearing of the action by his brother to have the old man's will reduced. A witness said the room in which Anderson lived was very dirty, and she would not have put a dog in the bed. He had a pair of blankets, but they were like coal-bags. When he left his belongings were put in half a dozen sacks, which appeared to contain rubbish, and the room had to be disinfected.

According to a neighbor Anderson said he had not much money and he did not know how long he would live. He used to collect cigarette and cigar ends and all sorts of rubbish. He would bring home skins, bones, and potato parings from ash buckets, and when asked what he was going to do with them he said they made grand "taste soup." With crusts of bread gathered in the same way he made "breadberry," but used buttermilk instead of sweet milk. A cat or dog would not have looked at the "crusts" he ate. For the defence evidence was given that Anderson had nothing mentally abnormal about him, and that he was shrewd and intelligent in regard to business affairs and investments.

His doctor thought Anderson was a sane man. He had an eccentricity; he had a great deal to say about himself; but there were "plenty of other men like that." Anderson, it was stated, had the air of a country-bred man who had been a servant in a "good family." But he was a miser of a man. The doctor knew that because when he said to him, "Well, Mr. Anderson, I'll give you a mixture," Anderson would reply, "You couldna mak' it pills?" The reason for the question was that the pills might cost a penny and the mixture would cost a shilling.
