POLICE COURT.—At the Police Court yesterday Wm. Berrigan was fined \$5 or 10 days for drunkenness. Wm. Stewart was fined similarly for the same offence. Stephen Larter and Lawrence Hennessey both had to pay \$20 or undergo thirty days' imprisonment in the alternative, and Owen Trainor \$20 or sixty days, all on charges of having been drunk.

EXCELLENT LECTURE.—Last evening at Grace Church Schoolroom, before a large and appreciative audience, Mr. J. H. Bell, K.C., Summerside, delivered his lecture on "Women's Suffrage." The lecturer, whose great ability is of wide repute, held the closest attention of his hearers throughout the course of his instructive and highly humorous discourse. At the close a hearty vote of thanks was unanimously passed, moved by Mr. D. Schurman and seconded by Mr. J. D. Seaman, and conveyed to the lecturer by the chairman, Rev. Mr. Littlejohns.

CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY.—The Children's Aid Society met yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock, when there was a good representation of members present. The truant officer reported 43 cases dealt with during the month. A letter from the Superintendent of the Girls' Home at Truro was read and discussed. This was all the important business.

DAY OF PRAYER.—The Canada Gazette of Thursday, Dec. 10, publishes the royal proclamation appointing Sunday, January 3rd next, to be throughout our Dominion of Canada, a day of humble prayer and intercession to Almighty God on behalf of the cause undertaken by Our Empire and Our Allies and of those who are offering their lives for it, and for a speedy and favourable peace that shall be founded on understanding and not hatred, to the end that peace shall endure; and We do invite all Our loving subjects throughout Canada to set apart this appointed day as a day of Humble Prayer and Intercession. Of all which Our loving subjects and all others whom these presents may concern, are hereby required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

THE BRANT.—The D. G. S. Brant has been ordered to Halifax for the winter, where she will be in the employ of the Navy Department.

CHESS CLUE.—The Charlottetown Chess Club met for practice at the Dalton offices last night. Quite a number of the members of the club were present and several interesting games were played. The "Tantorian Horse" was a novel and invincible, the renown of his chess strategy having gone abroad it is rumored that General Joffre will send for him for consultation so that his genius may be used to the discomfiture of the Germans in the region of the Alsace. AN ISLANDER.—President R. A. Falconer, of the University of Toronto, who is coming into the limelight, over the retention of three German Professors on the staff of the University, is one of the outstanding men in the Dominion. Dr. Falconer was born in Charlottetown, P.E.I., in 1867, educated at Queen's Royal School in Trinidad, and at the Universities of Edinburgh, Leipzig, Berlin and Marburg. Before his appointment to the presidency of the University of Toronto, which took place in 1907, he was Principal of Pine Hill College, Halifax. He is well known both as a writer and as a speaker. Under his presidency, the University of Toronto has made rapid strides, says the Montreal Journal of Commerce.

WOODEN WEDDING.—Last Thursday evening the home of James S. and Mrs. Farquharson, Bunsbury, was the meeting-place of a goodly number of invited guests. The occasion was the celebration of the fifth anniversary of their marriage—their wooden wedding. After the guests had all arrived the Rev. E. S. Weeks came forward and read the address of the Rev. Mr. Farquharson on behalf of the company. The popularity and esteem of these good neighbors was duly emphasized and as a slight token of respect a beautiful writing desk was presented. Mr. and Mrs. Farquharson replied in words of warm appreciation of the good feeling manifested toward them. Then the happy gathering sat down to a splendid repast and the evening until a late hour was most pleasantly whiled away in games, music, etc.

LARGE CROWDS.—"The Trey o' Hearts" was perhaps the means of attracting the usual great crowds to the Prince Edward Theatre yesterday. 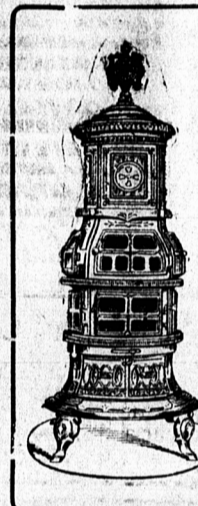

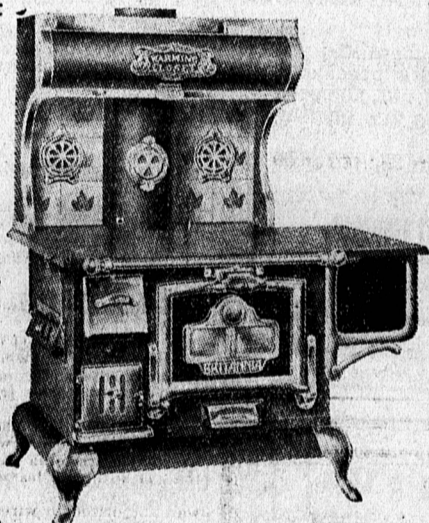
