## Newsy Letter From London

(By Dominion News Service.)

LONDON, July 9.—The "Season" is in full swing, and, despite execrable weather, it promises to be the most brilliant since the war. Debutantes were thrilled with the splendour of the presentation ceremony at Buckingham Palace. They were allowed to wear colours for the first time but most of them chose the conventional white and silver. They looked wonderful, with their veils and waltz frocks, though, truthfully confessed, the thousands of people who lined the curb peered into the windows of their motor as they waited in queue in front of the palace—the loveliest queue in the world.

Only two Canadians were presented this year, Mrs. A. H. M. wife of Professor Adams, formerly of McGill and now the president of Liverpool University, and Mrs. G. A. Heather of Kitchener, Ontario, who was presented by the Duchess of Devonshire.

The return of Princess Christopher of Greece, formerly Mrs. W. B. Lewis, of New York, doubtless will add much to the season's gaiety. Before her marriage to the youngest brother of the late King of Greece, she used to entertain lavishly in her beautiful London mansion, the residence of her son, William Lewis, a member of the beautiful young Russian princesses and Princess Christopher, who is tremendously wealthy, has been a fairy godmother to the Russian nobility in England.

Another American of international repute, Mrs. Vernon Castle, an actor and "best dressed woman in America," caused a flutter in London or rather among that smart part of it that can afford to belong to the Embassy night club—quite the most famous place of its kind in the world. Princess peers, diplomats, rub shoulders with actors, authors, journalists and the women are said to be the world's most beautiful, or at any rate, the most perfectly preserved. Lyphor Mrs. Castle is appearing there for three weeks at a tremendous salary. She really danced divinely and her dancing the night of her debut when the celebrities all flocked to dance with her after her "turn" was over.

It is amazing the interest people of every class take in racing, or rather, betting. I never quite believed the story I heard in Canada of a slim folk pawning their bed clothes to put a billiard or so on a horse, but now I know it is quite possible. Everyone who possibly can go to the principal races, and catch a glimpse of a horse, but the catch is tense with excitement, and every few yards a bookmaker, surrounded by a group of men, women and children, is shrieking to put five shillings on the horse.

There was a real drama in the theatre when the orchestra played the last performance of "Old Drury," which had run for only three weeks. It was vigorously applauded by everybody who saw it but somehow the public did not go, and the show, which employed five hundred people, was losing hundreds of pounds a week. Just before the curtain fell a man in a beautiful play offered to guarantee its run for another two weeks, in the hope that the public would get to hear about it. He was Mr. Samuel Greaves, a Scotsman who had made millions out of whiskey and loved the traditions of the theatre.

"Old Drury" is the national home of drama. Its story begins with the restoration of King Charles II when Puritan England cried out for life and colour. Several times it has been burnt down, demolished, and rebuilt, once by Christopher Wren and once by a committee of noblemen including

Lord Byron. Its stage has been the scene of countless triumphs. "Sweet Nell" of Old Drury made her debut there, and Mr. Pepys, himself, for it was David Garrick, the famous actor, who was a lessee once, and it was there that the beautiful Mrs. Siddons, whose picture, painted by masters hang in the National Gallery, made her greatest success. In the early years of the eighteenth century when the theatre was on the verge of bankruptcy, there is the point of the story—Edmund Kean an unknown actor who was engaged at a few pounds a week made such a tremendous success on his first appearance as Shylock that the theatre was saved. And now "Old Drury" and "Drury" the story of his struggles and triumphs, has been saved, and H. A. Saintsbury, whose life has been nearly as full of struggles as that of the actor he portrays, has been given another chance of success.

The London theatrical world is itself full of drama, tragedy and romance. A play called "The Gossamer" was produced a few nights ago by an unknown author, telling with passionate intensity of a crippled girl's agony, and appealing to the world and medical science to alleviate such suffering. When the curtain fell the immense audience cried, "an actor," and to their poignant amazement, Miss Dorothy Brandon, a life-long cripple walked onto the stage with a stick.

The plantation negroes who were such a success in New York, headed by delightful but funny-looking little Florence Mills, have succeeded in "putting across" their turn in "Dixie" despite the persistent objections of their predecessors in "The Runaway Revue." The first success was probably due less to employment among English actors and actresses than to the fact that the coloured players and their managers were unaware that England is absolutely "fed up" with "coal black mummies."
