Conservative opponent. A Farmer was nominated but declined. In other instances it has been a Liberal who has backed down, to the satisfaction of a stronger Farmer. It serves to remind one of the Irishman, who having buried two wives and being mortally ill, expressed a wish to be buried between them, but added, "With a cant towards Biddy." The United Farmer has a decided cant toward the Liberal Biddy every time, and vice versa.

Another feature is that many Drury candidates profess an ardent zeal for the enforcement of the Ontario Temperance Act, which was passed by the Hearst Government some years ago, when Howland Ferguson, now the Conservative leader, was a member of that administration. They also charge Mr. Ferguson with trimming his sails to catch the "wet" breeze. A like charge is made against prominent Liberal candidates. In former years the Liberal license board backed by the money of the rich brewers and distillers was an invincible force in elections. The brewers and distillers are still carrying on extensively, but the "dry" vote is stronger. The issue of prohibition enforcement further complicates the triangular party conflict. Should the Conservatives fail to gain a majority over all a Farmer Liberal alliance after the election is looked for as the result of the "cant towards Biddy."
