VALUE OF SEAL FISHERY.

ST JOHN'S May 6.—The season's seal fishery came to a close last night with the arrival at this port of the sealer Virginia Lake. The total catch was 350,000 seals valued at \$300,000. There was not a single fatality or serious accident among the five thousand men engaged and only one vessel, the Hope, was lost.

THE TRANS-SIBERIAN RAILWAY.

The Trans-Siberian railway begun in 1892 is to be completed by 1908. About 3000 miles of track have been laid and 2000 more are necessary to complete the line. The construction of the track has already necessitated the building of thirty miles of bridges. The tourist who goes over the completed road will need to take a good sized lunch basket with him, as it is said the journey from Moscow to Vladivostock will require eighteen days.

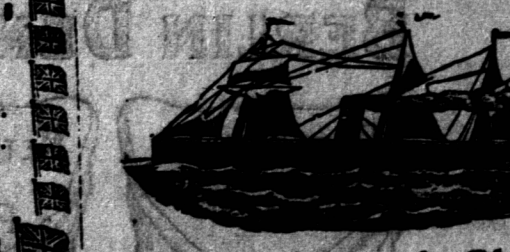
