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## Abegweits Lose First Encounter To "Hub" Team

### Island Squad Suffers 5-0 Setback At Hands Of Allan Cup Holders In Moncton Last Night.

MONCTON, Nov. 20. (C. P.)— Captain Dud James celebrated his election as captain by opening and closing the scoring. His final goal was a flip shot of Irvine's rebound which McCann blocked by falling to the ice but was helpless to stop James as the lanky centre star swooped in and flipped it over his prostrate body.

The Hawks could do nothing wrong tonight. They showed the Abegweits things they should remember about forward passing and defensive work. But the greatest factor in the champion's victory was the relentless speed they tossed at the Islanders from whistle to going.

#### Hawks Receive Pennant

Inspired by a huge pennant which was received today from the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association and which hung in the north end of the Stadium, the Hawks cut loose in the second period with all the fury that carried them to the pinnacle of Canadian amateur hockey last winter. The pennant, done in the Hawks colors, was received by Manager "Pop" Wheeler from W. A. Hewitt, C. A. H. A. Registrar and is emblematic of the Canadian Amateur Championship.

The Nicklin clan capitalized on their first big opportunity while Gross was still serving his first period penalty for cross-checking Connolly.

James, McManus and Webster worked a swift passing attack to the Abbies' blue line and then James sped down to McCann's forward step to receive a smart forward pass and flip the rubber past the goalie from a difficult angle.

#### McDonald Brilliant

Five minutes later Duke McDonald, who played one of the most dazzling games of his career, raced to the Charlottetown defence and blazed a rifle shot into the corner of the net. "Klok" McCann kicked as the net sagged behind him.

In the third period, McManus and James ganged the Island cage, for the third goal early in the session, McManus taking a short pass right in front of McCann and flipped the rubber into the cage. About ten minutes later Connolly tricked the defence and rifled a shot at McCann who made a sensational save but he was out of position when McManus came racing in from left wing to swoop the rubber into the cage.

#### Foster Saves Sensationally

The Islanders were only dangerous in a few raids and Foster pulled off sensational saves to rob Beaton of a goal in the third period and Kelly in the first period, who had crashed their way through the burly Moncton rearwardsmen. Gill and Bill Miller mixed up crashing body blows with clever blocking to turn back the Islanders with regularity.

"Red" Kelly was the pick of the Abbies, while Walker seemed to be the best on defence. Frank Currie, young Montrealeur was used sparingly and did not seem to hit his stride.

## Fighting Beaver Squad Drop Close Game To Wolves

### Frankie Graham Leads Halifax Team To Hard - earned 2-1 Victory - Wilson Spectacular In Saint John Nets.

HALIFAX, Nov. 20.—(C.P.)—Halifax Max Wolverines tonight renewed their seasonal challenge for the Maritime hockey championship by defeating the fighting Saint John Beavers, 2-1.

The fixture, officially opened by Premier Angus L. MacDonald, was the first match of the "Big Four" series in Halifax.

Last minute efforts of Ike Houston, the goal-getting right-winger from the Ottawa Senior City League, saved the Beavers from a white-washing. He shot home a hard fast one that never gave Sargeant a chance, in almost the last minute of the game, an exhibition of fast but generally lagged hockey.

Lacking the finished team play, Saint John appeared dull through the first period but came back strong in the second and third. But they could not withstand the voluminous bombardment on the net of Charlie Wilson, aptly nicknamed "Gibraltar."

The speeding plays of Frankie Graham, Wolf star defenceman, kept the puck raining on Wilson who made a total of 38 saves. After less than two minutes of the opening he shot in the first goal after collecting Lennon's rebound just after Draper, Beaver defenceman, had been chased to the penalty box.

But Beavers, outplayed in the first, staged a comeback to prevent a shut-out when Houston fired from the blue-line. Both teams failed to take advantage of scoring openings.

Knocked out by a stick in a melee in front of his net, Sargeant was carried from the ice and it looked as though Halifax would have to put in their sub-goalie. He came back, however, with a big handage over his left eye.

The spotlight all through the first period was focussed on the spectacular Wilson who went through a series of acrobatics to stop the hammerings from the Halifax batteries. He had 23 stops in the first 20 hectic minutes alone.

Saint John second string, with Foster Dickson in pivot position, started to work in earnest and combined to turn in several thrusts that kept threatening the Halifax net minder.

Referee Harry Butler was booted for some of his decisions, once by Captain Draper who did a little

shouting and then went off the ice two minutes to cool off. Draper reinstated Donald being put off.

Substituting for Paul Gagnon, flashy left wingman who has not yet received sanction of his transfer from Montreal, young Chumme Lawlor gave an individual exhibition of clever offensive and defensive play for the Wolverines.
