In Memoriam MR. CHARLES H. S. STERNS

Shortly after one o'clock yesterday afternoon Mr. Charles H. S. Sterns passed away at his home in Souris. He had been in declining health for some time and about three weeks ago his condition became serious.

The late Mr. Sterns was a native of Souris. He was in the 71st year of his age. He had spent his whole life in that community. For many years he was engaged in the mercantile business in Souris, and he successfully carried on one of the most extensive commercial businesses in King's County.

Mr. Sterns was for a life time a consistent member and elder of the Presbyterian Church and after the union with the United Church of Canada. He was a past grand master of Orient Lodge, A. F. & A. M. An ardent worker for Temperance and a member of the Temperance Alliance, he was unceasing in his endeavor for the moral uplift of the people.

In the passing of Mr. Sterns, Souris and King's County have lost one of their most progressive and enterprising citizens. In all his business dealings he was regarded as a man of sterling integrity, and shrewd business ability.

Not only was he largely occupied with his business operations, but he also had a strong grasp of the public affairs of the day. He was exceptionally well read, and was looked upon commercially, socially and otherwise as one of the leading men of the community. In all that made for the development and the betterment of Souris, King's County and the Province in general Mr. Sterns was recognized as a forceful and able assistant.
