**Black Is Featured
In Paris Styles**

PARIS, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Paris' opening style shows disclosed today it's going to be a black spring. Fully half the dresses, suits and coats at the openings were black or heavily trimmed in black. Hats, apparently are going to remain in the odd and ornamental stage. Some of them teeter forward on the brow, some on the side of the head, and only a few in the centre. Feathers and flowers are the decorative mode. Many hats are black, but a few and gowns of bright cotton and silk prints took male spectators out of the doldrums. The first show was staged by Jean Dessès, who held no brief for either longer or shorter skirts. Daytime hemlines were 12 inches from the floor, the afternoon jobs dropped to nine or 10 inches, and evening things were at mop level. Waist lines were so thin that some models looked as though they had been trussed with a drawstring.

In Memoriam

MRS. MARY MACAULAY
Many friends and acquaintances learned with regret of the death of Mrs. Mary MacAulay, a former native of Souris, which occurred recently in Springfield, Mass. Although she was not in robust health for some months past, her death was wholly unexpected. Two days before she passed away she was taken ill at her home at Summer Avenue. Her physician was called, who later had her admitted to the Mercy Hospital where the end came suddenly on January 13, 1948. Although the late Mrs. MacAulay had been a resident of the United States for the last thirty years, she never lost interest in the land of her birth. She made frequent visits to her old home where she enjoyed meeting friends of former days and visiting old and familiar scenes. Of late years Mrs. MacAulay spent much of her time in works of charity. She was an active member of the Good Shepherd Aid, and during the war years was associated with the British War Relief Society. Her husband, Augustus MacAulay, predeceased her eighteen years ago, and her only brother, A. B. Campbell died in the autumn of 1946. She is survived by two sisters, Mrs. (Dr.) A. A. MacDonald of Souris, and Mrs. L. Newhall of Springfield, Mass. The funeral services were held in the Holy Name Church, where a solemn requiem High Mass was celebrated, and later the remains were laid to rest in St. Michael's cemetery, Springfield, Mass.


