business written in the Dominion in the year 1927 exceeded in volume the total amount of life insurance in force in 1917. In his address on Business Insurance, Dr. Rockwell explained how, rapidly this idea had been developed and applied in writing the various needs and problems of business men throughout the whole Continent. He described in detail its particular application to the affairs of the individual proprietor, the partnership and the corporation, pointing out how effectively it served such purposes as extending and safeguarding credit, protecting both debtors and creditors, enabling employers to retain and reward faithful employees, etc., etc.

Mayor Martin's address on Service covered the various activities of a modern life underwriter and emphasized the necessity for a thorough knowledge of the business and an unselfish devotion to its ideals. He pointed out the heavy responsibilities which rest upon the modern life underwriter and gave numerous instances of the successful application of the principles of good salesmanship. Major Martin's talk was interspersed with many human interesting stories from his own experience which admirably illustrated the various points brought out.

The Life Insurance men attending are enthusiastic in their praise of the Congress to date and this indicates a much more interesting session today and tomorrow. This morning Dr. Rockwell and Mr. Chown, the general secretary of the L.N.A.C. will be the principal speakers and in the afternoon, Dr. Rockwell and Mr. W. G. Hogg.

The Markets

MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 6. - A feature of the local grain trade Saturday was the good inquiry for No. 2 Canadian western oats for seeding purposes. But owing to the very light offerings from Winnipeg buyers found it difficult to fill their requirements. On account of further weakness in wheat futures, at Winnipeg spot prices were, again reduced one cent per bushel. Car lots of Manitoba No. 6 wheat sold at 96c and feed wheat at 92c. The demand from the United Kingdom and the continent for spring wheat flour showed some improvement and a moderate amount of business was done. The local trade was also good and prices were firm. The movement of winter wheat flour continued slow but prices were moderately active and prices were unchanged. A fair trade was done in standard grades of rolled oats and the undertone to the market was firm. The weakness that characterized the local egg market last week was continued Saturday and jobbing prices for all grades of fresh and storage were reduced another one to five cents per dozen. The receipts were 1133 cases. A fairly active business was done in butter and prices were well maintained. Receipts were 59 packages. The trade in cheese continued quiet but the undertone was steady. Receipts were 141 boxes. The demand for potatoes was inactive but values were unchanged. Prince Edward Island green mountains sold at 88c and whites at 84c per 90 lbs. in bags. Canada beans were unchanged at \$5.25 to \$5.40 per bushel.

WASHINGTON, January 5. - Preparations for a nation-wide study of the influenza epidemic were spurred by the arrival today of Dr. M. D. Veldee of the Public Health Service, formerly in charge of typhoid investigations in Cincinnati.

Dr. Veldee was called here by Surgeon-General Cummings. He conferred with officials and began preliminary studies of telegraphic reports on conditions over the country. The public health study of the epidemic, which will include field studies involving house-to-house canvassing in representative cities, as well as intensive laboratory investigation, will be under the direction of Dr. A. M. Stimson, chief of the division of scientific research.

BRILLIANT 29-YEAR-OLD PROFESSOR ROMANTIC FIGURE IN KING'S ILLNESS

LONDON, Jan. 5. - The turn for the better in King George's condition has developed one romantic aspect, it has revealed to the public the genius of Dr. Edward Charles Dodds brilliant 29-year-old professor of bio-chemistry, who was called to the palace in connection with the calcium treatment which is being continued, and which, it is hoped, is helping the King to regain some of his depleted strength.

Ten years ago at the end of the war—Dr. Dodds was too young to join the army—he entered Middlesex Hospital as one among a crowd of students. No one knew anything about him. To-day he is one of the greatest authorities on bio-chemistry in Europe, and in a day has become known throughout the world because of his call to Buckingham Palace.

Dr. Dodds is Courtauld professor of bio-chemistry at Middlesex Hospital and Medical School and director of an institute built for the hospital by S. A. Courtauld specially to further his discoveries.

Five years after he entered the hospital he was made a student demonstrator, and his ability was so conspicuous that an institute of bio-chemistry for the hospital and found a professional chair.

Not only has he studied the properties of calcium; but he helped to devise a new process for large scale production of insulin at reduced cost.

Work and research are Dr. Dodds' only pastimes. He has no outdoor interests—an unusual characteristic for an Englishman—plays no games of any sort, and frequently remains working in his laboratory until midnight.

Can. National Steamers Sail

(Special to the Guardian) HALIFAX, Jan. 5. - With a cargo of 6,500 tons, the Canadian National steamer Canadian Victor sailed from Halifax today for Australian ports via the Panama Canal. The ship's cargo includes automobiles, automobiles parts, tractors, plaster and general freight. The Canadian Volunteer of the same line sailed from Halifax last night with capacity general cargo for the British West Indies and Demerara. The new Canadian National liner, Lady Drake, third of the fleet of five steamers to be put on the new Canada-West Indies service, is now loading cargo at Halifax and will sail on Friday, January 11, with a large number of passengers for the sunny south.
