**POLITICS IN QUEBEC.**

In a Province almost wholly Liberal, as shown by the federal and provincial elections, that capable Liberal Premier Mr. Parent is in trouble. A mere handful of Conservatives were elected in Quebec to the House of Commons and in the provincial election which followed the Conservatives as an organized body refused to undertake a contest, although a few of that political faith were returned to the Legislature. Mr. Parent's party is therefore quite strong enough, too strong according to the general requirements of party government. The Quebec Premier's case is precisely the opposite of that of Premier Ross in Ontario, whose majority has melted away to nothing, but whose too scant following are thoroughly loyal to their leader. Mr. Parent heads a Liberal party more than sufficiently strong in numbers, but many of them appear to want another leader.

From this distance it would seem that Quebec would do well to retain Mr. Parent as its Premier. He is a good administrator, and has managed the difficult finances of the Province with prudence and judgment. He has restored the equilibrium between the expenditure and the revenue and greatly improved the provincial credit. But he does not loom up as a great national figure to fill the imagination and intoxicate the minds of his people as Mercier and Chapleau did. He lacks the fervid oratory associated with those names, and with Sir Wilfrid Laurier's. The Quebec Liberals are not content to be merely well governed by an able and honest administrator on business principles. Hence the trouble. There is no other leader in sight who quite fills the popular conception of Quebec as to what a leader should be, and this may keep Mr. Parent in his present position.
