"Dizzy" Dean Responds To Crude Awakening By Ending Holdout Seige

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., March 19—Dizzy Dean signed his 1937 contract with St. Louis Cardinals tonight after a stormy session with the management. The ace pitcher, who will receive a reported \$25,000 for his services, first balked on a "good behaviour" provision. He walked out after a conference with Sam Breadon, club president, and said "it's all off." Later he went back to talk with Breadon and signed. Breadon said he had "exactod no promises and made no conditions. He signed a straight baseball contract."

The great St. Louis pitching star cut to the quick by information that he was boring his bosses and baseball writers with his annual holdout fairy tales, is a very subdued young man today. It's a good bet that henceforth the GasHousers will have little or no trouble with their one-man ball club.

A Big Business

Dizzy has discovered at the early age of 26 that baseball is pretty big business that can't fold up because one man decided to give it the go-by. The great Babe Ruth was past his prime when he made that discovery. Lou Gehrig found

it out only a few hours ahead of Dizzy by agreeing to sign. The two boots that hurt Dizzy the most were delivered by Sam Breadon, owner of the Cardinals, and stories by baseball writers to the effect that they were getting all fed up with the young man who used to roll them in the aisles with his wisecracks and pop-offs. When Dizzy capped his greatest holdout battle in years by asking baseball Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis to place him on the voluntary retired list, Breadon shocked his pitcher by agreeing that it was a swell idea. That scared Dizzy into thinking he might be making a mistake. Sometimes it's harder to get off the retired baseball list than it is to get on it.

Advisor-in-Chief

Mrs. Dean, advisor-in-chief to her husband, was partly to blame for the final, torrid blast the weary baseball writers leveled at him. When three New York writers attempted to get a good sound interview from Diz last Wednesday, Mrs. Dean broke it up by honking the automobile horn. The result was the writers wrote the real low down on Diz' holdout act, stripping it of all hokum and romance. After the story had appeared, the same writers went to see Mr. and Mrs. Diz again. Both of them were sitting on the lawn of their home outside Bradenton and were subdued. It didn't take an oracle to see that Dean was on the verge of surrender in his contract argument.

MONTREAL, March 19—The Canadian Lawn Tennis Association meeting here tonight decided to invite a Scottish team of two men and possibly two women to compete in tennis tournaments in Canada next summer. The Scottish players will be asked to enter Quebec and Ontario provincial championships, the Dominion championships and to play an international match against a Canadian team. The Association discussed a proposed visit to Canada of the English Wightman Cup team in July and August and sought arrangements to have the players compete in exhibition matches in Toronto and Montreal.

Local Midget Team Comes From Behind

The Charlottetown Midget Red Wings won the second game of a double header here tonight by a score of 5-3 over Summerside Midget Crystals. This is the first game of a total goal series for the Island midget title. The game was played under protest by the Red Wings who objected to Charlie Hogan being on the crystal line-up, as he had played senior hockey. This protest, however, was overruled by President Dowell of the M.A.H.A. Referees Pat Power and Jim Hogan handled the game.

Play was ragged as the teams took the ice. Both teams tended to play one man hockey as the heavy ice made passing erratic and slow. The Crystals took the lead at 9:37 when Hickey raced in to slam G. Arsenault's rebound over J. Davis' sprawled body. The Red Wings fought back and gave the Crystals plenty to think about. Boates made some sensational saves as the Charlottetowners pressed. McLeod evened the score in a wild scramble in front of the Crystal cage at 14:25. The ice became even heavier as both teams gave up teamwork and batted the puck around in wild sprees.

The Red Wings forced the play in the opening minutes of the second period, but Charlie Hogan caught the Red Wings up the ice to race in on the goal. Hogan tripped but Hickey raced in to sink the puck into the open net. The Wings evened the score four minutes later when Darrach took McLeod's pass to speed in before firing a hard drive past Boates. At 15:19 C. Hickey got his third goal of the evening when he took H. Gallant's pass out from behind the Wings net to slam it home. The Charlottetown boys came back at 17:51 to tie the score again with a wing drive by McLeod. The play see-sawed for the remainder of the period which ended three-all.

Play roughened up in the third canto as the heavy ice gave the defences a chance to punish the opposing forwards with rugged checks. The Red Wings went into the lead for the first time during the evening at 5:35 on a score by McLeod. Charlottetown widened the margin at 15:35 as McLeod got his fourth goal on a pass from Darrach. The Crystals were awarded a penalty shot but Davis made a great save on Sinclair's blazing drive. The Summersiders played five men up but the Wings cleared up the ice. The game ended 5-3 for the city boys.
