QUARTERLY REPORT OF GRAND DIVISION

I am pleased to report that from a comparison of reports given us by P. G. S. John Anderson that our membership report today is the largest ever reported in the history of the Grand Division. I think I am safe in assuming that never was our order stronger than just now, never did we have a better temperance sentiment than just now.

From reports to hand I am encouraged to say that in many sections of our jurisdiction a splendid work has been done, our order is growing and is becoming we believe to be widely recognized as an order of moral and social interests. There is also a general trend of advancing sentiment since our last quarterly and annual session which is being crystallized into a readiness on the part of the people to avail themselves of more stringent amendments to our Prohibitory Law, now in force throughout the entire Province.

Now the question for us to consider is how can we hold that position and if possible gain ground. By personal observation I find that we need combine land consecrated effort if we are going to make much progress in our work. It will require on the part of the Grand Officers a general system of visitation and in that way find out the weak spots, their evils, and then provide remedies. I believe in any divisions probably get discouraged, lose interest, wither, and die from such needs having probably never witnessed a Grand Officer within its wall since its organization.

During the present quarter I have had the privilege of visiting a goodly number of divisions and on such occasions I was much impressed with the strength, the concord and especially the active part taken by the young members in their respective duties. I found in some divisions that the work was wholly carried on by the young members and which must be to them a good training school in fitting them for life's duties.

Young people should be deeply interested in the temperance cause. This country is ours in which to live; it is ours to put up with the evils of the accursed traffic.

It has also been my privilege to assist our energetic and enthusiastic Grand Worthy Patriarch in arranging a number of joint meetings of divisions which he will doubtless mention with much pride in his report today. Meetings which have been instrumental in infusing new life, besides furnishing valuable information to your Grand Officers.

District Division No. 4, is still meeting every quarter. The fraternal visits there arranged prove to be quite an impetus to the work of our order.

I do not hear anything concerning District Division No. 5. Let me say just here our western county requires more attention at the hands of our Grand Division, there are places where I believe new divisions might be organized and carried on successfully.

Now there being many important matters to be dealt with at this meeting I shall not make an extended report. I wish to call the attention of the divisions to the fact that a new Ritual is now being issued which all subordinate divisions will be required to purchase in a reasonable time. The new Ritual includes 1 Blue Book, 10 officer's cards, 1 doz. ode cards, 1 music card, all for \$1.10.

I now wish to make the following suggestions:

1. That all deputies may be required to attend all sessions of Grand Division and if necessary the seven divisions pay their expenses.
2. I would recommend the appointments of a vigilance committee in every

On a Ninety Thousand Acre Reserve Lately Opened Up For Him

TORONTO, Jan. 28.—Word was received at the Parliament Buildings to-day to the effect that the Dominion Department of the Interior has made a treaty with the Indians on the reserve lying between North Bay and Sturgeon Falls, whereby 90,000 acres of the reserve have been opened for settlement. The Indians, who are of the Chippewa tribe number about 230. They are getting \$170 a head for giving up the land mentioned, and are also retaining a portion of a reserve on the shores of Lake Nipissing. The land now opened for settlement is good agricultural land.
