Contract Bridge Old? Get Pep, Vim

LEAD-DIRECTING DOUBLES Only in the rarest instances is it wise to double a slam bid by competent opponents, but sometimes the failure to double is very unwise indeed!

North dealer. Both sides vulnerable.

West fingered the singleton heart, but finally decided that that lead might trap a minor honor in East's hand and, set up the entire suit, so he hopefully laid down the diamond king. Dummy ruffed, and, after drawing two rounds of trumps, declared the suit broke 3-3 and thus permitted the discard of a heart from the closest hand. Now a heart was led from dummy, and when the ace was found on side, it was all over. Nothing could defeat the slam at this stage.

In view of the fact that far better than normal breaks were needed for the six-spade contract to be fulfilled, it is fair to point out that North-South deserved no credit for bidding so strongly. Nevertheless, it was up to the opponents—specifically East—to protect themselves and not to put their faith in the vagaries of "distribution." East should have doubled the six-spade bid! He should have realized that a heart lead by West would be highly desirable, and that it might be—as it was—absolutely vital, and that would have been the message conveyed by the double. A partner's double of a slam is essentially a lead-directing device, warning partner not to open the defenders' own suit, but to make an "unusual" opening. In cases where the opponents have bid another suit, that is what is most likely to be meant by the term, "unusual opening."

Secretary Canadian Education Association



The President and Director of the Canadian Education Association announced yesterday the appointment of Mr. E. K. Stewart as Executive Secretary of the Association. GRAHAM WAFER CREAM PIE

1 Graham wafer crust
2 tablespoons corn starch
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 cups scalded milk
3 egg yolks
1 teaspoon vanilla
3 egg whites
6 tablespoons sugar
METHOD: Reserve about 3 tablespoons of the graham wafer crust mixture, and press the remainder into a well greased 8-inch pie pan and bake as directed above. Cool the crust.
Mix together the corn starch, 1/4 cup sugar, and salt and gradually add the scalded milk. Blend thoroughly in the top part of a double boiler and then cook over boiling water for 15 minutes, stirring frequently. Beat the egg yolks slightly and blend a little of the cooked mixture into them, then turn back into the rest of the hot mixture. Stir and cook for 2 minutes longer or until the eggs are set. Add the vanilla and cool slightly, then pour into the rest of the hot mixture.
Make a meringue with the 3 egg whites which have been beaten until stiff, with the 6 tablespoons sugar, added gradually. Spread this over the cream filling in the crumb crust and then top with the reserved crumb mixture. Bake in a slow oven (300 deg. F.) for about 20 minutes, or until the top is nicely browned. Cool well before serving.

Women Conclude 6-Day Meeting

REGINA, June 9 (CP)—Mrs. R. J. Marshall of Toronto was re-elected president of the National Council of Women of Canada which opened a six-day annual meeting in Regina tonight. Other officers re-elected included: Mrs. G.D. Finlayson, Ottawa corresponding secretary; Miss Georgene Faulkner, Halifax, recording secretary and Mrs. Alan L. Smith, Montreal, treasurer. Earlier Mrs. Marshall said the time has passed when women should think in terms of "our own country" and they now must think in terms of "our own world." Mrs. R. J. Marshall, of Toronto, president of the National Council of Women, said tonight at the opening of the organization's 54th annual convention.

Tenders Called On Debenture Issue

HALIFAX, June 9 (CP)—A Premier Macdonald tonight called for tenders on a province of Nova Scotia debenture issue of \$10,200,000. Tenders will be opened June 11. Proceeds of the issue will be used together with sinking funds and amortization funds to retire an issue of \$12,370,000 maturing Sept. 15 in New York and being called for redemption. The new debentures include \$5,000,000 in serial bonds, \$2,500,000 bearing interest at two per cent and maturing in one to 10 years, \$1,250,000 at 2 1/2 per cent maturing in 11 to 15 years, and \$1,500,000 at 2 3/4 per cent maturing in 16 to 20 years. The remaining \$5,200,000 is in 2 3/4 per cent straight term bonds of 21 years. They are callable in 1955 or later and will carry a two per cent sinking fund. Both issues will be dated June 16, 1947.

Welfare Workers Paint Dark Picture

HALIFAX, June 9 (CP)—A bleak and gloomy picture of needy unemployment in Halifax was painted today by welfare workers, one of whom compared conditions to those during the "early days of the depression." Although seasonal programs of private and public construction now are under way, the officials said they were no longer able to cope with multiplying pleas for assistance from jobless, many of the applicants, they said, were heads of large families. "Things are bad in Halifax and they are going to be worse," said J. J. (Pop) Kelly, civic welfare inspector. "I hate to think of what is going to happen to many people next winter." Dr. A.R. Morton, public health and welfare commissioner, agreed that "it's going to be bad next fall." Most pessimistic note was sounded by Miss Helen Burgess, family

Insurance is paid for a maximum of one year and applicants must meet certain requirements to qualify for it.
