

Discover Serum To Combat Dread Livestock Plague

CHICAGO, May 24—The American Journal of Veterinary Research reports a successful American and Canadian research project which resulted in a defence against a dangerous livestock plague which the Axis might have attempted to introduce into Allied countries.

The magazine, published by the American Veterinary Medical Association, described Thursday how seven American officers and two Canadian scientists set up a secret laboratory on a remote island off the mouth of the St. Lawrence River and won a research battle against time and a malady known as "rinderpest."

"Rinderpest is one of the most devastating diseases of cattle," the report said. "The purpose of the project was to develop ways and means of protecting the livestock industry of the North American continent against a foreign disease that might be introduced intentionally, as an enemy method of biological warfare."

Early in 1942, the report said, a war disease control station was set up at Croisee Isle, Que. The virus of rinderpest was brought from South Africa, and the scientists began research to develop a vaccine which would protect American cattle against the disease and which could be produced in large quantities.

After months of research, the scientists developed a method of growing the virus of embryonated hens' eggs, and from these egg embryos producing a vaccine which would make cattle immune to the disease.


The magazine said the new vaccine holds promise of helping stamp out rinderpest in Africa, the Orient, and other parts of the world where it has been a perennial problem. It already is being used in one unidentified foreign country.

MEAT SAVING TIPS

Unwrap meat as soon as it comes from the butcher. If left in the original wrappings juices will be drawn out and the meat will be dry after cooking. Wipe meat with a damp cloth and if not being cooked immediately, cover loosely and keep it cold.

Use moderate temperatures for cooking meat. This saves meat and fat for the meat, shrinks less and the drippings are of better color and flavor for future use.

Cover cooked meat closely, to prevent drying out and keep it cold.

Ground meat whether cooked or raw spoils quickly. Cook ground raw meat promptly or store in freezing compartment of refrigerator. Grind left over cooked meat just before using.

Whitehall Notebook

LONDON—Ivor Thomas, 40-year-old parliamentary secretary to the civil aviation ministry, is a mild-mannered but determined Welsh journalist who has decided to honor his office by learning to fly an airplane himself.

He is taking instruction from a civil-aviation ministry pilot and says he has found flying "the most natural form of locomotion in the world."

He was a notable runner 20 years ago, winning top races on the continent as well as in the United Kingdom.

Another former fast-racing man in the news is Philip Noel Baker, minister of state, who made a long journey in haste from a north of England town to bring help to a companion who had fallen over a precipice and suffered serious injuries.

Mr. Noel Baker between 1909 and 1912 won the half-mile three times the mile twice for Oxford University in competition with Cambridge.

Top hat M. P. Sir William Darling, Conservative M. P. for Edinburgh South and former Lord Provost of the Scottish capital, recently demonstrated a member's right to sit in the House with his hat on his head.

For the occasion he chose a handsome silk topper, which even in London is unusual today. He had a long morning coat and striped trousers, a hard winger collar and thick black tie. Every time he rose to ask a question, the Labor members cheered and the opposition cheered back.

Resigning? Phyllis letters from political opponents still are being received by Eric L. Gauder Dover, Conservative M. P. for Caithness and Sutherland, who said during his election campaign last year that he would resign when Japan was beaten.

The Caithness Liberal Association has elected Mr. Dover a new letter asking him what prevents him resigning and his reply reiterates his previous statements that he is expected to resign from a Churchill national government and instead found himself an option on membership. He also expected the Japanese war to last 18 to 24 months longer than it did.

CALCUTTA — (CP) — As the result of a cut in rations supplied to service canteens, the army in India has surrendered over 2,000 tons of flour and 5,000 tons of sugar since early March to meet civil needs in the face of a food shortage.
