NEW YORK, May 30—Turning loose an eight-run barrage in the seventh inning, Boston Bees went on their biggest offensive spree of the year at Brooklyn today to down the Dodgers 11-4 and climb into a fifth place tie with Brooklyn in the National League.

While Bill Wei and Ira Hutchinson limited the Dodgers to four hits between them, the Bees collected 20 off four futile fingers.

CUBS SWEEP SERIES

At Chicago, Cubs swept their four game series with Cincinnati Reds today by taking the final 7-1 before a crowd of 19,365. It was the eighth straight reverse for the floundering Reds.

The Cubs blasted Lee Grissom off the mound in the first inning with a five-run attack and coasted in from there behind the air tight pitching of Larry French.

PHILLIES HALT GIANTS

The Phillies at home defeated the Giants today before 8,000 fans by a score of 6-3, halting the New Yorker's winning streak at eight straight.

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Martin Wins Featherweight Championship

SHERBROOKE, Que., May 30—(CP)—Frankie Martin, Canadian Bantamweight Champion, took over the Featherweight Title Saturday night by scoring a 10-round decision over Gerald "Young" LeBrun of Sherbrooke.

Martin's win gave him the National Boxing Federation's recognition to the title held by Ray Cook of Toronto, who has been idle a long time.

Fast on his feet and carrying plenty of punch in either hand, the 26-year-old Montreal boy had the edge most of the way and gained the unanimous verdict of three judges.

LeBrun, though lacking Martin's polished style, showed a powerful left and right hook, but Martin's speed and foot kept him out of danger most of the time as he scored repeatedly with short jabs to the face and body.

Only in the fourth did Martin look bad. After taking two rights to the face, he went down for a one-count from a hook that hit his neck. After that, he carried the fight.

Denny Shute Retains PGA Championship

BY SCOTT RESTON Associated Press Sports Writer PITTSBURGH Field Club, May 30—(AP)—Denny Shute of Boston successfully defended his United States Professional Golfers' Championship here today by defeating Harold "Jug" McSpaden, Winchester, Mass., one up in a stirring 37 hole battle.

Given a second life on the 36th green where the faltering McSpaden missed a four-foot putt for a birdie three, Denny won the 37th with a par four to McSpaden's bogey five.

Three up at the end of the first 18, Shute squandered his lead on the first nine in the afternoon, was two down with three holes to play, and then raced home to tie the match on the 35th.

Victory for Shute confirmed that he is perhaps the most undying golfer in the land, and, one of the really great iron players of his day.

Austin Bows To Fine Service Of German Ace Esquires And Artillery Play Tonight

PARIS, May 30—Heinrich Henkel, Germany's No. 2 player, crowned his quick rise to tennis stardom today when he defeated Henry W. (Bunny) Austin of England, 6-1, 6-4, 6-3, to capture the French hard court singles tennis championship.

He succeeds his Davis Cup teammate, Baron Gottfried Von Cramm who did not defend the title he won last year from Fred Perry.

Henkel's triumph gave Germany a sweep of singles honors as the German-born Mrs. Hilda Krahwinkel Sperling took the women's title today with a 6-2, 6-4 victory over Mme. Rene Mathieu of France.

As Von Cramm and Henkel won the men's doubles title a week ago, today's performance stamped them as dangerous competitors for the Davis Cup. They're favored to win the European zone competition and to give Germany a strong possibility of surviving the interzone final and meeting Great Britain in the final.

All Stars Bat Out 12-2 Win Over Nationals

INDIANAPOLIS, May 30—(AP)—A bomb bursting at 10 o'clock (EST) tomorrow morning will send 33 of America's greatest automobile race-drivers from the starting line in the silver anniversary 500-mile automobile race.

Speedway officials predicted the greatest crowd in history—more than 160,000—will pack the plant to watch the battle for approximately \$100,000 in prize money.

The drivers were unanimous in the opinion they would have to drive faster than ever before to win. The present record, established last year by Louis Meyer of Huntington Park, Calif., is 109.609 miles-an-hour.

Meyer, who has won three Indianapolis races, will be in the starting field. Two other former winners will be with him. They are "Wild Bill" Cummings of Indianapolis, sitting in the pole position, and Kelly Petillo, Los Angeles Italian.

Sweeny Wins Amateur Golf Championship

BY GAYLE TALBOT Associated Press Staff Writer SANDWICH, England, May 30—(AP)—Youth and stamina carried the 25-year-old American expatriate, Bob Sweeny, to the British Amateur Golf Championship Saturday.

Lionel Murray, veteran Irish lawyer who played golf before Sweeny was born, gave the Anglo-American youngster a terrific battle but finally wilted in the sweltering heat and surrendered 3 and 2, in the 36-hole final.

"I confess I'm a trifle weary," the Irishman, obviously exhausted, said with a smile as Sweeny rammed down the final 20-foot putt that ended the match on the 34-green.

Sweeny was born in Pasadena, Calif., and still is a United States citizen although he was reared abroad and for the last 15 years has lived either in France or England. Hector Thomson, Scottish star who won last year, was prevented by ill health from defending the crown.
