### Scientific Miscellany.

Quick drying of insulations is effected by German electrical manufacturers at ordinary temperatures by placing the objects in a vacuum.

The absolute zero, or temperature of space, is estimated by M. D. Berthelot, from a study of the expansion of gases, to be a little more than 273 degrees C. below zero.

Reports from 22 British towns show that London, the only one supplied with river water, has almost the lowest death-rate from fever—67 per million. The rate at Plymouth is 40, while at Glasgow it is 184, and at Belfast it reaches 1667.

A singular fly, resembling a large horse-fly, is reported to exist near Redding, Cal. It is called the sulphur fly, was unknown until copper smelting began in the locality three years ago, and seems to live and breed in sulphur heaps, in the midst of dense sulphurous acid fumes from the roasting ore.

The movement studying tropical diseases doubtless means much for the health of the world. It is exciting the interest of the great colonizing nations, and the new school of such diseases at Liverpool is to be followed by a similar institution in Germany, while the States is not to be in the rear in work of the kind. These maladies are held to be largely preventible. Prof. Koch, the greatest German authority, expresses the belief that the blackwater fever, the most deadly disease of West Africa, may be readily prevented when made better known by such observations as the Liverpool school is to collect.

Ozone, now readily produced by electrical means, is likely to find other fields of usefulness in addition to destroying invisible germs. Its powerful oxidizing effect is asserted by Mr. J. H. Lamprey, an English botanist, to be quickly fatal to the green fly, red spider and other pests of conservatories, while it does not harm the plants.

The early detection of tuberculosis is very important, and Dr. J. Rudis-Jinsky finds that a positive diagnosis of the disease at its beginning is made possible by X rays. In twenty cases of pulmonary disease, the degree, position and relation of the affected areas were more fully and accurately shown than by any other means.

A singular and unexpected source of danger was lately discovered on a French boiler. The top of this was covered with sand, and a tiny steam jet escaping around a rivet set some of the particles in motion, creating a novel sand-blast that was rapidly cutting a hole through the shell of the boiler when the leak was fortunately detected.

The remarkable theory that underground waters, like the ocean, are affected by the moon is advanced by P. Guichard, a French chemist. He is led to this conclusion by an investigation of certain wells near the coast, the water of which rises and falls with the tides yet has a composition disproving the explanation of a direct connection between the wells and the sea.

A study of the strange and little understood abnormal growths of plants has been made during the last twelve years by M. Hugo de Vries. From seeds of the unnatural plants he has reproduced many descendants of normal type, but a sufficiently large number of abnormal individuals to prove that the monstrosities are hereditary and a result of disease. The only anomaly not reproduced in the succeeding generation was the green given some plants by parasites.

The influence of the American mechanic upon our times is due in no small degree to his automatic machinery. Among such devices lately introduced into England are machines for equipping an immense cycle factory at Leeds, and a machine for making metal hinges. In the latter, coils of metal ore fed through rolls having a cam motion, and then gradually manipulated into the separate wings of the hinge. Wire rod from a coil is fed in at the proper time to supply the connecting bolt for the hinge. The entire process is automatic and butt hinges ready for use are turned out at the rate of forty or fifty per minute.

A simple method of electroplating on wood has been described by Mr. C. F. Barnes, who believes that the process should be of considerable advantage in decorative work. The article is saturated with copper sulphate, which—after drying—is converted into insoluble sulphide by exposure to a current of sulphurated hydrogen gas, and the sulphide in turn is reduced to metallic copper when the wood, lightly wrapped with fine copper wire, is suspended for some minutes in a solution of common salt at the cathode of a suitable current. A copper coating of any desired thickness may then be given in the ordinary plating bath, a silver coating being finally added if desired.

A sponge of honey in a small pot was carried by Greek nurses to soothe children, said Prof. Mosby in a late address to British antiquarians. In the British Museum are two Greek vases, dating from 700 B. C., that are much like the later Roman feeding-bottles; and another old example is a bow-shaped terra-cotta vessel, with a funnel rising from the middle of the back. A feeding-bottle taken in 1861 from an old Roman cemetery at Canterbury was of bright-red polished ware, and had doubtless been buried with its infant user.

### The Use of Nuts.

As a diet, nuts are very wholesome. In cookery, all of our native nuts have their particular uses. Even our despised peanuts are now employed in a variety of ways. Crushed and rolled to a fine powder, they can be used almost the same as flour. In parts of Europe where the chestnuts are common nuts, the natives grind them to a powder, and bake bread and cakes out of it. These cakes could be imitated in this country with good results. Both peanuts and chestnuts are used for sandwiches in afternoon teas and luncheons. The nuts are ground to a powder, and then mixed with mayonnaise dressing. The paste thus produced is spread over the thin slices of bread. A lettuce leaf is sometimes added to make the effect more tempting.

Nut soup is made by roasting them to bring out the aroma, and then after they are pulverized with the rolling-pin they are boiled to a soup. Then strain through fine cheese-cloth, and use the liquid as soup stock. The soup can be flavored with a little lemon, onion, leek, or other articles, but the flavoring should never be so strong that the nut taste and aroma are disguised.—New York Voice.

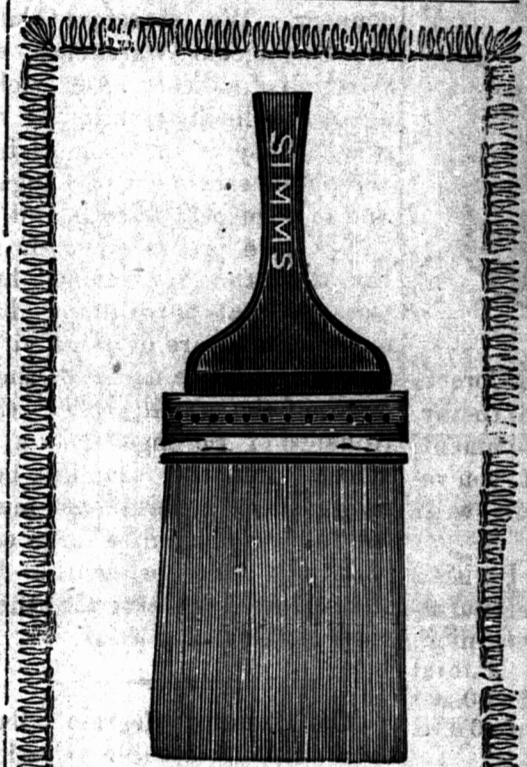
