CITY HOCKEY LEAGUE

WILL OPEN WEDNESDAY

Rovers, Anchors and Stars Will Battle for Honors For Local Puck-Chasing Title—The "Green" and "Blue" Will Face off in Inauguration.

A largely attended meeting of the City Hockey League was held Saturday night at the offices of Dr. F. C. Duggan, Great George street and it is gratifying to state that said meeting proved to be a huge success, in so far as local hockey is concerned, as a schedule was drawn up, the first game to take place on Wednesday, between the Anchors and Rovers, game beginning at 7:45 sharp.

At the outset of the meeting Dr. Duggan, the president in the chair, clearly outlined the business of the gathering, stating the time had now come for a show-down with reference to the proposed City League games, and if any progress was to be made the sooner some activity along those lines was shown the better it would be for all hands. The following representatives were present:

Morgan—Earle Prowse, Byron Brown, H. Saunders, Stars—Fred Kelly, Earl McInnis, Oil Team—Ivan Reddin. The latter representative, on behalf of the team offered his application of withdrawal, due to the fact that it was impossible for the "Oil Team" to secure releases for their players, they therefore deemed it unwise to remain in the league. The withdrawal of the above mentioned team leaves the Rovers, Anchors and Stars to fight it out.

The following resolutions were put before the meeting and carried: Resolved, that each team be limited to ten men per game. Resolved, that the receipts of each game be divided between the two competing teams.

The question of referees was left over to be taken up by the executive committee. It was also moved and seconded that the league series consist of nine (9) games, to be played two games a week to a conclusion. The following is the schedule:
