## THE CHILDREN AND GOOD ROADS

Everywhere throughout North America profound interest is being taken in the work of highway improvement. Different States of the United States, as well as the federal Parliament of Canada and the Legislatures of the different Provinces are making this year much larger appropriations than ever before for the improvement of the roads. Great trunk highways are projected through the Province of Quebec, and a movement is taking shape for a national highway through Canada from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

In addition the Canadian Highway Association, with headquarters at New Westminster, B. C., is endeavoring to interest the youth of the land in this great question, and the President, Mr. Kerr of that city, has offered gold and silver medals for the best essays on What Good Roads mean to Canada, to be competed for by boys and girls under eighteen

years of age. The Guardian is informed that the competition is awakening much interest throughout the Dominion. After all, the question of good roads should be of more importance to the young people than to the middle-aged and the old, from the fact that they will have occasion to use the roads much longer than their seniors.

It is to be hoped that the changes now being made in our road system by the Legislature may indirectly lead to a more practical and patriotic interest in the roads throughout this Province. Our highways are made by the people for their own use and the better the roads the more advantage the people along the different highways routes will receive, and the value of farm properties will also thereby be increased. When other Provinces of Canada are taking so much interest in road improvement we cannot afford to be left behind.

## INTER-IMPERIAL TRADE.

Hon. George E. Foster, the Minister of Trade and Commerce is an enthusiast in promoting better trade relations among the British Dominions and dependencies overseas. The agreement with the British West India Islands is also in accordance with the recommendations of the British Royal Commission, at whose head was so pronounced a free trader as Lord Balfour of Burleigh, so that it may be counted upon as meeting the views of both Canadian protectionists and British free traders, and also leading in the direction of drawing the different parts of the Empire close together.

The coming consultation between members of the Canadian Ministry and the British Admiralty with regard to Imperial Naval Defence is looking in the same direction, and may lead to most important results. Hon. Mr. Foster is also endeavoring to bring about closer relations of trade between Canada, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa, and when these are effected the dream of inter-imperial preferential trade will be something nearer. Whether it shall be realized in the near future or not will depend upon the action of the United Kingdom itself, the Keystone of the imperial arch. If a change of Government shall take place there the process may be hastened somewhat but in any case a gradual, if slow movement toward a preferential trade arrangement throughout the Empire seems to be taking place.

## THE NEW ROAD AND TAX BILLS.

The new road and tax bills now before the Legislature may be briefly summarised as follows:—  
The annual road tax is fixed at \$1.50 for each male person, those over 65 years, clergy men, teachers engaged in teaching and road masters being exempt. Horse are liable to a tax of 25 cents as at present. Ten hours work on the roads under direction and to the satisfaction of the road-master, will be accepted in lieu of cash payment of road tax. Payment for horses in commutation of tax will be allowed at the rate of 50 cents a day for horse and cart and \$1 a day of ten hours for teams of horses. The school district

will be the road district. Road masters will be appointed and sworn for each district who will receive pay. They must furnish bonds and make sworn returns. They will collect all taxes.

The old land-tax system is repealed. Land taxes will be one fifth of one per cent of the value. An assessment list will be prepared for each road district. Taxes in arrears may be recovered by distress and sale. In future years notice for road tax shall be sent out before the first of April, and those wishing to work instead of paying must notify the roadmaster within six days after receipt of such notice.

The new plans for the care of the roads and levying and collecting taxes appear to be simple and likely to prove effective, especially if competent roadmasters are selected.

## THE LEGISLATURE.

The session of the Legislature so far has been characterised by steady work and proportionately less talk than in any session of that body which we can recall. The House has met more promptly on the hour appointed than heretofore. The Guardian records from day to day the time at which the House opens to the public, which is usually fifteen to thirty minutes after the hour named for the meeting. But in the meantime prayers and the reading and amending of the journals have taken place. The attendance of members has been commendably regular and prompt. Mr. Speaker Wyatt has a strong sense of order and decorum and executes his office with diligence. It becomes increasingly evident that the House has a capable, dignified and genial head. Premier Mathieson is indefatigable in pressing forward the work of legislation, and he and his colleagues are very prompt in replying to questions, in giving explanations and furnishing any information the members require. In the meantime numerous delegations have been courteously heard and very frankly answered from day to day. Our legislators have undertaken and are carrying through much important legislation and are doing it in a business-like way. This is as it should be.

## WILL TRY TO PROVE RICHESON INNANES

**BOSTON, April 10**—Insanity of an unusual form, which will be described by alienists at the hearing before Governor Foss and council, and a disorderly state of mind, carrying with it the claim of legal irresponsibility, will be alleged in the petition for commutation of the sentence of Clarence V. T. Richeson from death to life imprisonment.

A volume of evidence relating to Richeson's family history, which Attorney John J. Lee, of Virginia, has been collecting, will be augmented by the findings of mental experts engaged to observe the prisoner in his cell. Although he has not written a letter to his son since the latter confessed that he poisoned Avis Linnell, the prisoner's aged father, Thomas Varland Richeson, will come to Boston from Amherst, Virginia, to be in close touch with the proceedings in to which every possible effort and influence will be instilled to save the former Cambridge preacher from going to the electric chair during the week of May 19.

**FRENCH SURGEON CURES CANCER BY ELECTRICITY**  
**PARIS, April 11**—In a paper read before the Physiotherapy Congress here last night, Dr. Doyen declared that he was now able to confirm his theory that it was possible to cure cancer without a surgical operation by means of electrical treatment, which he described as thermic-electro coagulation.

In all cases treated, said Dr. Doyen, the cancer was easily accessible. They included cancerous affections of the skin, lip, tongue, tonsils, larynx, and other organs.

**LOWELL, April 11**—William E. Trautmann, of the I. W. W., announced today that he expected an

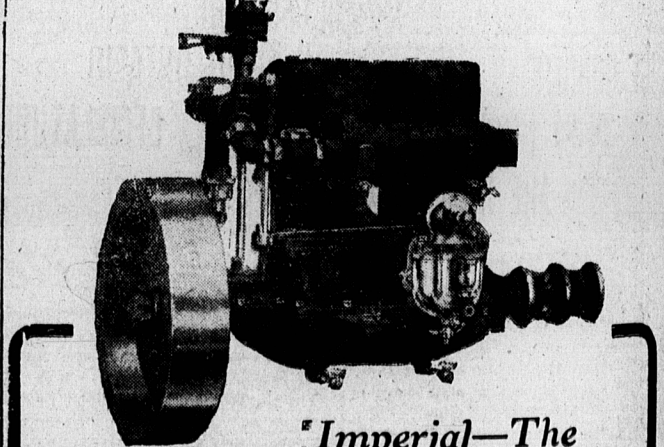
