The Rev. Wm. Duffield, who is to preach at St. Peter's Cathedral, this evening, at 7.30, is the guest of the Master of the Rolls.

At an early hour yesterday morning, the marriage of Miss Emma Webster to Mr. George Chandler, of the P. E. I. R., took place. The ceremony was performed by Rev. G. M. Young. Miss Edith Webster, sister of the bride acted as bridesmaid, while the groom was supported by Mr. John Collings. After the wedding breakfast, Mr. and Mrs. Chandler left by the western train for St. John, where they will visit Mr. Chandler's sister, Mrs. Copp. A number of friends were at the station to see the happy couple depart, and made their presence known by showers of rice. The Political Meeting.

railways and threatened to import in tank vessels if they did not reduce their rates. They then went to the Canadian oil wells and told them what they would do and now they control the oil wells of Canada, and to-day Canadian oil which used to be much cheaper than the American cannot be bought. The chances are that by the present time the Canadian wells would if left alone, be supplying as fine a product as the American [applause].

Mr. Stewart then dealt at length with the increased price of binder twine and the barb wire monopoly. He then reviewed the financial records of both parties and claimed the Liberal Party did not have any great public work to show. Instead of reciprocity as promised they had blocked the policy by placing a number of articles on the free list, and by so doing had missed an opportunity which had been offered to no other party.

Proceeding Mr. Stewart claimed that 76 per cent of the free goods came from the United States, that nearly \$100,000 had been spent on commissions; that the High Commissioners sent to Washington displayed ignorance and that Stuart Fairbanks said Laurier would make a nice president for a lawn tennis club. (Cheers and laughter) He said they had increased the superannuation charges, had not reduced, but increased the taxation, taking eight to ten millions a year more out of the people. He read Mr. Foster's resolution protesting against the large expenditure, yet Sir Louis had said the opposition did not oppose their extravagance. He claimed that cold storage was left as the late government left it, and we were far behind the United States. A tramp steamer was sent to P. E. Island and the sheep died on board. (Cheers.)

There would be cold storage and fast ships when the new government came in. (Cheers) He claimed that the Liberals had violated every pledge; they had adopted the Conservative tariff policy; they had fallen from their high perch of purity—had fallen even in their own estimation. No party with such a record could stand. Even Mr. Charlton condemned them. Fielding feared to run in Picton. Russell, defender of dog biscuit rations (laughter) had been driven out of Halifax. In conclusion he bade his supporters be of good cheer. The ballots, falling like snowflakes on 7th November would snow the Liberals under. (Prolonged cheering.)

It was 11:10 o'clock when amid hearty Liberal cheers Sir Louis rose to reply. The estimates he said were before the House seven times and the opposition did not call for a division. Their mouths were stopped by their own action from talking about extravagance. (Cheers) He quoted figures to show the duty paid in 1896 was \$18.23 on each \$100 worth of goods and in 1900 was but \$15.52. The rate was lower, but if people bought more goods of course they paid more duty. As to superannuation they changed the law so that it did not apply to future appointments. This reduced the number receiving allowances from 4,236 to 3,159 and they were steadily decreasing. (Cheers) Mr. Stewart had said they should have settled some questions at Washington even if they could not settle all. This young man seems to know more than his leader. Sir Charles Tupper said we did right. (Applause) He denied that Senator Fairbanks ever spoke slightly of Sir Wilfrid, whom he held in the highest regard, as did all in this Empire from the Queen and Lord Salisbury y down. (great cheering) As to scandals, had there been one commission or committee that reported a single charge proved? (No No) He was proud of the Crow's Nest contract. Foster begged to have the bill brought in and no opposition member opposed it. It gave our farmers the supply of the Kootenay mines, before supplied from the States. The Government stipulated that all roads should have running powers through the Pass and that the C. P. R. should reduce freight rates in the North West which amounted to \$700,000 a year to the people. (applause and calls of "time") Sir Louis closed with an eloquent defence of Minister Borden on the emergency ration matter. The Minister's own son was there and died there. Did they think he would want to injure his own son? (Cries of "no" "Time," and prolonged cheering.) Then there were cheers for both candidates, one after the other for several times and the meeting broke up.
