### Premier Does Not Mince Words

#### Prime Minister Answers Soviet Representatives

"Canada Will Not Alter Her Policy Towards Russia" States Mr Bennett, "And If You Break The Law You Will Be Punished As Sure As The Sun Rises".

OTTAWA, Aug. 2.—(By The Canadian Press)—Canada will not alter her policy towards Soviet Russia. In most emphatic terms Prime Minister R. B. Bennett made this answer today to the Workers Economic Union delegation which demanded removal of the embargo against the Soviet Union.

The "dumping" of wheat, asbestos and lumber into the world's markets by Russia under Soviet labor with disastrous results to Canadian workers and farmers was instanced by the Prime Minister. "Do you believe the workers of this country should not have a fair chance in honest competition," he asked.

### British Expect Canada's Offer To-Day Or Tomorrow

No Definite Gesture Of Concession For Concession Has Been Received. Conference Will Conclude On Or Before August 20.

So far, it is stated at British headquarters, no definite offer of concession for concession has been received. There have been discussions. The discussions are continuing. Morning, afternoon and again tonight, the British "cabinet" of seven was in session, examining the requirements of the various dominions so far as submitted, endeavoring to determine how far they can be met.

### MANY HAVE CLOSE CALL IN MT'L. FIRE

Fifteen Firemen In Hospital As Result Of Stubborn Blaze In Francois Theatre.

MONTREAL, Aug. 2.—(By The Canadian Press)—Fifteen men in hospital, two of them in a serious condition, and 25 others treated for smoke poisoning, was the price the Montreal Fire Department paid today in conquering a stubborn blaze which raged for eight hours in the Theatre Francois, one of the city's few remaining links with the glamorous days of the old melodrama.

### ONE CASE OF TYPHOID AMONG BONUS ARMY

Health Officials Condemn Vets' Billets As Unsanitary.

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., Aug. 2.—R. B. Ellison, contact officer of the hungry and tattered bonus expeditionary force bivouaced in a suburban park, said tonight that it will not disband despite a recommendation from Commander W. W. Waters that the 7,000 men, women and children break ranks and go to their home states. Ellison said he was speaking both for himself and for Captain Doak Carter, chief of staff and second in command to Waters.
