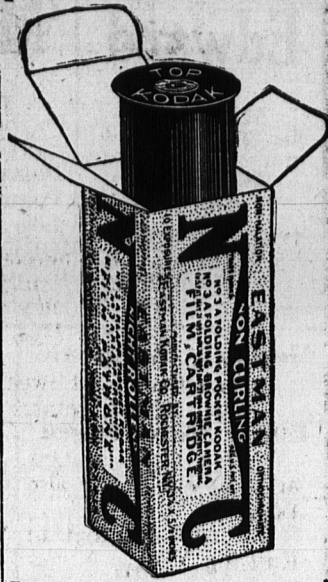

POLICEMEN ENLIST—Two more policemen offered their services at the recruiting station yesterday for the 64th Battalion, says the Halifax Chronicle. They are John McInnis and John Kellock. Both men retire from the police force with good records and after having given satisfactory service. McInnis came from Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island and joined the force last April. Kellock is a Scotchman and joined the force two years ago. Before coming to Canada he served in a Highland Regiment and this will make his service in the 64th all the more valuable.

ARTILLERY ARRIVE—After having been stationed on garrison duty at Canso for thirteen months in the very day the members of the P. E. Island artillery battery arrived in Charlottetown Monday night. It was on the 6th day of August last that the boys arrived in Canso from Charlottetown to take up their duties there and on the 6th September they returned. They left here a body of 22 men and three officers. Since that time their numbers have been depleted by the fact that some went to the front in drafts and others were transferred to Halifax, so that returning there were just 25 men and one officer, Lieut. J. Parker Hooper who was in command. The men have returned to Charlottetown to take their places in the P. E. I. Heavy Battery for which they volunteered their services when the idea was proposed, every man of them at the time offering their service, so that they are really the first volunteers for the Battery. McCachern, A. Morgan, E. Stewart, Corporal Callaghan and Bombardier McVey who were in charge of transport arrived home last night.

P. E. ISLAND CAR FERRY—Capt. Taylor returned Saturday evening from Halifax. While there he had the pleasure of inspecting the Prince Edward Island Car Ferry. He says in shape she is the finest ice-breaker he had ever seen. How low to all appearances is just what an ice-breaker should have. She is much more strongly built than any of the ice boats here and for accommodation she is simply palatial, having everything possible for the comfort and convenience of the public. Her accommodation for officers and crew is also splendid. There is no doubt, Capt. Taylor thinks, but that she will give a good account of herself.

QUITE AN EXPERIENCE—The Pictou Advocate says:—Mr. J. J. McKinnon, Charlottetown, the P. E. I. oil man, had a business experience in Pictou the other day which was very annoying but which did not lack some elements of humor. He had a car of gasoline due here and came over from Charlottetown to look after its transfer from car to casks for shipment

across the strait in a schooner. He soon found the car and the number was 0. K., so he gave his men orders to go ahead with the unloading. After they had taken out 60 casks one of them submitted a sample for test to the customers' officer and was told that it was kerosene and not gasoline. It turned out that a car containing kerosene bound for Halifax had the same number as the one having the gasoline for Mr. MacKinnon and the two cars had got mixed. One was a Standard Oil Company's car and the other was from the independent company which is represented by Mr. MacKinnon. For a time Mr. MacKinnon had visions of his gasoline being used for kerosene and of exchanging in hundreds of homes, but the mistake was discovered in time to prevent the selling of gasoline for kerosene.

SCOTCHFORTH AND VICINITY—Messrs William J. McDonald and Plus McBride, Scotchfort, left Monday morning for New Glasgow, N. S., to work in the shell factory. Quite a few people have gone to New Glasgow recently from this part of the Island, nine in all having left Scotchfort in two weeks. It is rather sad to see so many strong young men leaving for abroad when their help is needed right here on the Island, but the lure of big wages and plenty of work seems to be too great a temptation to resist hence their leaving for foreign shores. Quite a lot of work has been going on the roads in Mount Stewart and vicinity recently conspicuous among the roadwork in the Mt. Stewart Bridge which has been in a very bad condition for the past summer. It was recently repaired and is once more in good condition. Harvesting has begun in Scotchfort and thereabouts and some very heavy fields of grain are to be noticed especially the wheat which in general is a bumper crop. The many friends of Mrs. Mary Egan, Scotchfort, who has been ill will be glad to learn that she is recovering. Mr. McLeod Douglas, Mt.
