(From the Newport Evening News, Newport, Rhode Island, U.S.A.) Mr. Montague Howatt, building superintendent of the Army and Navy Young Men's Christian Association, died of his home on Brooks Avenue this morning. He had been unable to attend to his work at the Army and Navy Building for the past three months. Mr. Howatt came here from Providence, where he had been superintendent of Y.M.C.A. building for a number of years, and came here shortly after the Newport Association Building was opened, and had been superintendent until his last illness. His work in this capacity was of the highest order, showing unusual executive ability and he had the reputation of having the best as far as upkeep was concerned among the Army and Navy Buildings in the country. Mr. Howatt became a member of the St. Paul's Methodist Episcopal Church soon after coming to Newport, and had been an active worker in the church until his health failed. Mr. Howatt was 63 years of age, and is survived by his widow, formerly Miss Lily McBurnie, of Newport, whom he married in 1892; two sons, Henry, who served and was gassed in the world war, and is now under treatment at the Veterans' Bureau Hospital, near Los Angeles, California, and Lloyd, a machinist in the cartoning machinery corporations shops in the city; also one daughter, Miss Marretta of New Bedford.

The remains were taken to Providence, where they were laid to rest in the North Cemetery, often spoken of as the most beautiful cemetery in the United States. The late Mr. Howatt referred to in the Newport Evening News, was born in Bradford, P. E. I., and was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Howatt of that place. He is survived here by one brother, Wm. J., on the old home farm, and one sister, Mrs. Edward McPherson, of Cape Traverse; also a brother, Benjamin, a member of the Winthrop police, Winthrop, Mass., and a sister, Mrs. Christi Wood, of Boston.

The team which will represent Prince Edward Island in the Inter-Maritime Rifle Trophy Contest, which will be shot at Bedford Rifle range near Halifax on Thursday, June 14th, was selected on Saturday evening by a committee consisting of Col. MacKinnon, Major C. MacLeod, Lt. F. G. Kennedy and Mr. G. M. Moore. The committee feel that they have one of the strongest teams that has represented the Island in years, and fully equal to last year's Island team, which won the trophy and established a new record.

Major C. McDonald, York who captained last year's team will act in the same capacity this year and Lt. F. G. Kennedy, who so ably coached last year's team, has given up a shooting position on the team at the request of the committee and the members of the team, in order to again coach it. The team, which will push this morning show that the trial shoots some remarkable scores were made. For instance Private Percy Hooper of Milton, made the remarkable individual score of 103 points out of 105, thereby winning the sterling silver spoon donated by Col. MacKinnon for the highest score in the trial shoot. Capt. A. W. Allan, M. C., won the sterling silver spoon given by Mr. G. M. Moore for the aggregate of three shoots. Capt. Allan scored 297 out of a possible 315 points.

Below are the scores of the eight riflemen who represent this province on Thursday: They are not in order of merit. Capt. A. W. Allan, M. C.—100, 99, 98, 297. Pte. E. Coles—93, 94, 96—285. Sgt. A. J. McCabe—97, 95—282. Pte. A. O. P. Gill—94, 97—288. Pte. F. Hooper—97, 96, 102—296. Sgt. J. Andrews—97, 96—291. Pte. A. Gormley—96, 96. Pte. J. Landrigan—97, 94. The two last named were only able to attend two practices so they did not complete the three shoots. Lt. F. G. Kennedy has a total of 291 for the three shoots, but as stated above has given up his place on the team to act as coach. The team leaves by early morning train Wednesday for Halifax, returning Friday evening. They will have their final practice this afternoon at 2.30.
