Yugoslav-Hungarian Pact near

By J. Reilly O'Sullivan Associated Press Staff Writer. BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, Dec. 12. (AP)—Informed sources said tonight that negotiations between the Hungarian and Yugoslav Foreign Ministers have reached the state where the signing of a pact of friendship and consultation may be expected, probably tomorrow. Previously, it had been thought that conclusion of the agreement would await a visit to Budapest by the Yugoslav Foreign Minister, Aleksander Cincar-Markovic, but it was said subsequently that this visit might be postponed until January, when there is a possibility of negotiations for a non-aggression pact. Diplomatic circles predicted that Belgrade would be the host, probably next week, to another Foreign Minister—Ivan Popoff of Bulgaria—but of this there was no official confirmation. Some political quarters saw a Hungarian-Yugoslav rapprochement as forming the cornerstone of the Axis plans for a "new Europe." To this, Hungary is committed; Yugoslavia has offered to co-operate provided her independence and territorial integrity are not endangered.

Butter price Situation

OTTAWA, Dec. 12.—(CP)—The War-time Prices and Trade Board continues to keep a close eye on the butter situation, acting in collaboration with the Department of Agriculture with which numbers of protests against any attempt at butter price fixing have been lodged. Butter now is priced at about 33 cents a pound wholesale, four or five cents above what it was last year at this time, having advanced during the past few weeks in anticipation of storage stocks showing a shrinkage. Stocks are down 15.5 per cent, and production is off.

The problem, it was said today, embraces the possibilities of increase in price, imports of butter and possible manufacture or importation of margarine at the end of November was down 7,700,000 pounds, as against a year ago, to 41,168,020 pounds. During the winter months beginning in November farmers produce less than is consumed, and this condition continues until the end of April.

Farmers, it was understood, have been more vociferous in their demands that the price of butter remain unlinked than consumers in asking that it be set.

If a maximum price for butter is fixed the farmers want a minimum figure as well and suggest ice cream should be also set.

The Bureau of Statistics reported domestic disappearance of butter during November increases approximately 2,800,000 pounds from the November 1939, figure but dropped nearly 16 per cent, compared with last October, 1939.

24,700,000 pounds, compared to 21,800,000 pounds during the corresponding month last year. Disappearance during October was unusually high at 29,400,000 million pounds, an increase of 20.4 per cent, over October, 1939. (A spokesman for the agricultural branch of the bureau attributed the increase to large military orders, apparently based on requirements of some months). During November 15,006,629 lbs. of creamery butter was produced, compared with 22,605,687 during October and 15,396,059 during November, 1939. The decrease in November occurred only in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Quebec and Ontario. Cheese production during November was 5,959,606 lbs., compared with 5,136,546 lbs. in the same month last year and 15,867,077 during October. Increases over last year occurred in all provinces. Creamery butter prices at Montreal averaged 30¢ cents a pound for first grade during November, compared with 28¢ cents for November, 1939. Ontario colored cheese at Montreal averaged 14¢ cents, compared with 15¢ cents during the same month last year. Exports of butter in November amounted to 148,800 pounds, compared with 144,800 pounds in November and 248,800 pounds in November, 1939. Cheese exports were 9,289,600 pounds, compared with 18,229,400 pounds last month and 18,822,400 pounds in November a year ago.
