### In Steel Works May Number 64,000

### THE AFRICAN SITUATION

### Not Generally Hopeful. But More Prisoners are Being Captured,

### MORE BOERS CAPTURED.

LONDON, July 15.—(Special).—Lord Kitchener reports the capture of thirty one Boers of Scheep's Commando in a surprise on his laager; also ammunition and stores.

Most of the prisoners are rebels. He also reports the capture of the wife acting President Schalkburger.

### SITUATION NOT VERY HOPEFUL.

Returned officers from South Africa do not speak hopefully of the situation. They say that small sections around Pretoria, Bloemfontein and Johannesburg are held securely and in them the people can settle down peacefully but broad districts of the Transvaal and Orange River Colony are still ravaged by guerillas.

### BIG STRIKE AT PITTSBURG.

PITTSBURG, July 15.—(Special).—The strike at the steel works is now on in full blast in the tin plate, sheet and hoop mills and may extend to embrace all the employees, about 64,000.
