## WIPING BIG GAME OFF THE EARTH

OTTAWA, Aug. 13.—In all the thousands of miles from Vancouver to the North Sea and from Edmonton to Dawson, the country is dotted with hunters at intervals from twenty to one hundred miles apart. From this it will be seen that the game has no stretch of more than one hundred miles where the crack of the gun is not heard. With nearly every one it is a case of doing his level best to kill all he possibly can, even though ninety-nine per cent goes to waste and rots on the ground. The Indians are the only men who regard the protection of game as a necessity, says a Dawson correspondent of the Toronto Globe.

"I have been in the Northwest for eleven years and traveled from east to west and from north to south, and have seen slaughters of large game on several occasions that would make Buffalo Bill's buffalo killing, which is famous the world over, look like child's play. The first of these I witnessed toward the head of the Klondyke River in the winter of 1898, when a herd of caribou came upon a hunter's camp and he killed the herd of three hundred. I must say that that man's credit that he left nothing to waste, as he was within reach of Dawson, and disposed of it all.

"The only thing to be condemned was the killing of the females. Three years later I was up in the same vicinity and found a hunter and his partner camped toward the head of a gulch with very steep slopes and thousands of feet high. These gulches are used in winter by the traveling lower lands in search of food. It happened one day that a large herd came down this gulch and the hunter saw them as they descended from the high barren hills. Once down in the gulch there was no retreat, as the snow was too deep and the slopes too steep to climb. He had them corralled and killed the entire bunch, just for the sport of seeing them fall. He had no means of getting them out of the herd, and practically the whole herd rotted on the ground.

"On his way to Dawson he killed a mouse weighing nearly a ton. By this time the hunting season was closed and the animal lay and rotted. A White river. The upper half of the American side, and a hunter who had just returned from killing a whole herd of caribou.

"How many hundreds there were in the herd no one knows, not even the slayer, as he did not get a piece of the herd or snow shoes for three days, shooting all the time until the last one was dead; then only was his bloodthirsty appetite satisfied. When he returned the fourth day the first ones, which were nearest his cabin had already begun to rot. Had he killed for only one day he would have enough for himself.

## RECORD SALE OF COTTON GOODS

NEW YORK, August 13.—An auction sale of cotton goods was begun in this city today that is believed to break all former records for sales of that kind. More than 32,000 cases comprised the lot to be sold, and there is said never before to have been so many packages in a single sale, moreover, "much cotton reported. The sale, moreover, was remarkable for the number of buyers attending it, the count exceeding 500. They represented both jobbing houses and large retailing firms, and it was estimated that practically every state in the union had at least one representative present.

## SIX ARE KILLED IN THIRD ACCIDENT.

TOULON, Aug. 13.—Six persons were killed and eighteen injured in a gun explosion aboard the gunnery schooner Couronne today off Les Salines d'Hyeres. The accident occurred while a number of recruits were receiving instructions in handling a 1.64 millimeter gun, the breech of which blew out. Three of those injured are in a desperate condition. According to experts in gunnery, the accident was due to the decomposition of "B" powder, but the men in the turret at the time of the accident, declare that the gun became overheated, owing to the rapidity with which it was being fired.

The shell had hardly been pushed home when it exploded with tremendous force. Sheets of flames darted backward from the gun and those deck. Several of the men were terribly mutilated. All the occupants of the turret were more or less injured. This is the third fatal accident to occur on board the schooner Couronne within the past sixteen months, all of which were due to the blowing off of breech blocks. In the first, April 19, 1907, three men of the crew of a four inch gun were killed and five were wounded. All the accidents occurred off Les Salines d'Hyeres where the French artillery school is situated.

**RAIN PUTS STOP TO FOREST FIRES.**

TORONTO, August 13.—"Rain hard here to-day. Some hard."

This telegram was sent last night by G. G. S. Lindsay, general manager, who received this morning by Crow's Nest Pass Coal Company, and is taken as meaning that the forest fires that are still burning will be effectually smothered by this the first rain.

When asked by The Herald as to the despatch from Fernie that the city council is negotiating for the electric light and telephone franchises, R. Young, secretary of the Crow's Nest Coal Company, the owners, said today.

"There are 200 telephones in Fernie. The system was first built to connect our collieries, Michael, twenty-five miles away, Coal Creek, five miles, and Carbonada, ten miles. We have only colliery phones at these three places. The electric light system obtains its power from one plant at Coal Creek. The proposal has not reached us here yet and I wonder how the city means to find money. We would have to reserve enough power any way for our collieries."
