It is believed that a definite tax program will not be submitted by the administration for at least a week. Last night inflationists in Congress warned Democratic Congressional leaders that they would open the fight to pay the Soldier Bonus in greenbacks within two weeks, when President's new tax is expected to be divulged.

At the same time the American Federation of Labor is backing the President against currency inflation. We would expect the market today to attempt to renew its advance again. Montreal, Feb. 6—Quebec Power report earnings of \$1.07 on the common shares for 1935 as compared with \$1.22 a share in 1934.

Power Corp for the six months ended Dec. 31 report net earnings of \$645,000 as compared with \$643,000 the same period a year ago.

The value of the company's portfolio, however, is indicated to have increased some \$4,000,000 during the six month period, giving the common stock a book value of approximately \$16 per share.

Profit-taking N. Y. Stock On Montreal Exchange

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Feb. 6—Traders paired to take profit from recent heavy gains on Montreal Stock Exchange today and only a few powers and selected issues made headway.

Metals, textiles, constructions, liquors and beers were off at the close of a session that saw volume decrease considerably. Banks held barely steady.

Quebec Power was taken up in large blocks and firmed a point when buyers learned that the company's annual report showed greater improvement than was anticipated. Canadian Northern, Shagbush, Southern Canada and Corporation gained fractions.

High-priced utilities were heavy and Canadian Hydro-Electric Preferred turned over rapidly for a loss of more than three points. International Power Preferred lost a fraction of a gain of more than 12 points yesterday.

Consolidated Smelters dropped five points on a sale just before the close after turning over in odd lot quantities earlier. International Nickel found demand that boosted the price 3-4. Noranda and Hollinger were even.

Niagara Wire at 48 and the Preferred at 59 3-4 reached their highest points since 1934 with gains of three and 1 3-4 points respectively. Tooke Brothers Preferred added a point on its first transfer in recent months.

Sales were 33,494; bonds \$8,100.

Pickle Crow lost 15 cents. Dome weakened 3-4. McIntyre 1-4 and Wright Hargreaves gained 10. Toburn came to the front with a gain of 18 cents.

Better Showing Made By Moirs Ltd. In 1935

Local holders of securities in Moirs Ltd., Halifax, will be pleased to learn of the better showing made in 1935.

For the year ended December 31, 1935, Moirs Limited reports net profit of \$104,404 after expenses, taxes, and provision for doubtful accounts, as compared with \$13,435 in 1934.

After deducting \$45,000 bond interest, there was a balance of \$59,404 in 1935, which was transferred to depreciation reserve. Interest on the present bonds, outstanding to an amount of \$750,000, accrued only from January 1, 1935, so that none was payable in 1934.

Balance sheets as at December 31, 1935, shows current assets of \$69,546 against \$913,692 on the like date of the preceding year, and current liabilities of \$342,659 against \$423,472, indicating net working capital of \$525,887 against \$490,160. Bank loans stood at \$203,000 against \$313,000.
