GERMANS SEIZED ALL FOOD AVAILABLE

Denuded Belgium of many of its resources during the early periods of the war.

Prof. Karl Ballod the German statistician, has compiled figures to show that the requisitions made by the German army forces in Belgium have more than offset the losses sustained by the Russians when the first successful Russian drive began. Prof. Ballod's figures are appalling and after reading what the Germans took out of Belgium at the start it is not to be wondered that the people of that country are starving today.

Tons and tons of food have been removed and the owners—rather their wives and children—for the men are fighting—have been left to starve. Such is the way of German soldiers. And the civilized world must supply the food for these people. You and your neighbor must give from your plenty to the women and children who have nothing, whose daily food for months and months has been one pint of soup and three slices of bread.

WOUNDED PET DOG BACK FROM FRONT.

QUEBEC, Que., Nov. 1.—An amusing incident connected with the arrival of a party of convalescents here last night was the appearance of a prindle bull dog, who is back wounded. The dog was smuggled over to the firing line by Private Klontsky, a member of the 4th battalion, first Canadian contingent. Private Klontsky enlisted at St. John N. B., and brought his pet dog with him. He cleverly eluded the vigilance of the officers by putting the dog in his kit bag when leaving England for the front. The most peculiar fact of it is that the pet dog was wounded the same day as the owner, May 24th last.

RUSSIA WILL ALSO INAUGURATE A BLACK LIST.

PETROGRAD, via London, Nov. 1.—In a black list similar to the one in force in Great Britain and including the names of most of the foreign firms trading with enemies of Russia, soon will be published by the ministry of trade and industry, in accordance with a decision of the council of ministers, which need not be the signature of the Emperor to become a law. The maximum penalty for infraction of this measure will be one year and four months imprisonment, or a fine to 25,000 rubles.

The new ruling, the Associated Press is informed by the foreign office is aimed chiefly at firms masquerading under neutral names, but essentially belonging to enemy countries.

MANY GREEKS PERISH AS RESULT OF GERMAN SUBMARINE WARFARE

LONDON, Nov. 1.—The Chronicle today says:—"Further details regarding the torpedoing of the Greek ship Angelika shows that another crime against the usage of civilized warfare must be added, to the ghastly history of the German submarine warfare. The vessel left Piraeus at 7 o'clock in the evening having on board 150 officers and men who were going to Saloniki to join the national defense movement. After nightfall the Angelika was sailing off Eleves with all her lights burning, and showing those signs of nationality which Germans themselves advised more than a year ago, that Greek ships should display.

"At 9 o'clock the vessel, according to her Captain, who has just returned to Piraeus, was torpedoed without the slightest warning.

"The torpedo struck her amidships but as she was sailing near the shore the Captain had time to turn her head toward land and beach her, thus saving many lives.

It is believed fifty persons perished as the result of the explosion of the torpedo. Another Greek vessel came along, and encountered the submarine and was warned not to go to the assistance of the Angelika, under pain of being torpedoed also. The lack of help resulted in the loss of lives, which might have been saved."

ROYALIST FORCES AND SOLDIERS OF VENIZELOS ARMY CLASH IN GREECE.

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—The correspondent of The Tribune at London

cables that the encounter between troops belonging to the Venizelos army and Greek Royalist forces, which took place yesterday at Goula, when several soldiers were wounded on both sides, has drawn fresh attention to the Greek situation in military and diplomatic circles in London.

The position of the entente powers as officially stated to the correspondent, is that they have no desire to precipitate anything approaching civil war in Greece, but that at the same time they are willing to recognize the Venizelos government whenever it appears to be dominant. The likelihood remains that a repetition of the present incident will stir up a conflagration at any moment and upset all the plans of the Allies.
