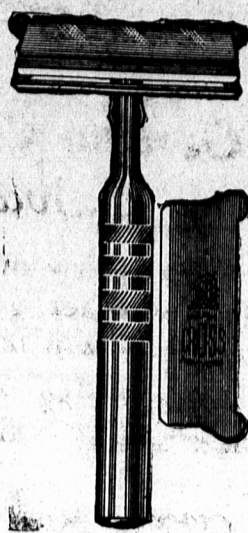

THE WEATHER THE TEMPERATURE TIDE, MOON ETC

TORONTO, August 9.—Moderate winds, mostly westerly; fair and moderately warm.

THE WEATHER.—Yesterday was cloudy in the morning, clearing towards noon with bright sunshine in the afternoon; clear at night.

The highest temperature recorded yesterday was 77 degrees above zero and the lowest was sixty one above. The lowest the previous night was 55 above. At nine a. m. it was 61 above and at nine p. m. 65.

The tide will be high this afternoon at 4.27, tomorrow at 5.36 and Monday at 6.48; it will be high tomorrow morning at 4.03, Monday at 4.50 and Tuesday at 5.42.

The sun sets this evening at 7.21, tomorrow at 7.18 and Monday at 7.16; it rises tomorrow morning at 4.54, Monday at 4.55 and Tuesday at 4.56.

The moon sets tonight at 10.43 and tomorrow at 11.24.

There was a new moon on Thursday, August 2nd, at 8.55 a. m.

The first quarter of the moon will be on Saturday, Aug. 9th, at 12.03 a. m.

The length of today will be fourteen hours and twenty-nine minutes and of tomorrow fourteen hours and twenty-four minutes.

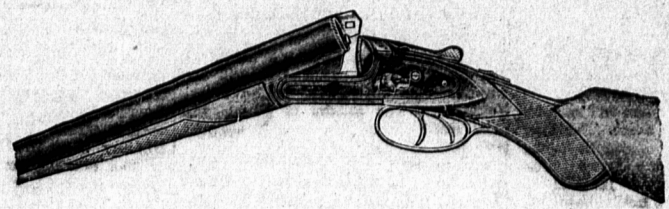

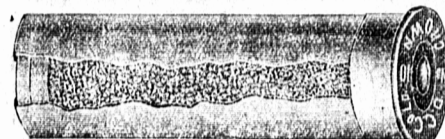

NEW YORK, Aug. 7 (Special).—As the fall season approaches that banking specter—crop funds—which is the cause of so much apprehension in money centres, begins to assert itself, and unless there is a speedy and decided change for the better in general conditions both here and abroad, it is apt to be more of a problem this year than it usually is. The money situation is a peculiar one—there are so many loose ends to be gathered up; and from year to year the complications appear to be increasing rather than diminishing.

Crop movements always require vast sums in the United States, Canada also calls for a considerable percentage of her needs and this year, with the new Canadian Bank Act in effect, the demands from across the border are likely to be heavier than in the past. The new Canadian gold reserve, operative since July 1, is the little joker that may result in the withdrawal of gold from New York at a time when New York can least afford to ship it. The one thing that can prevent this extensive withdrawal of the precious metal from this center is exceedingly high call money which may induce Canadian banks to keep their reserve funds here.

"Almost the only change effected in four hundred years," says J. M. Conroy of Aragalasi the leader of the bounty agitation, "has been the substitution of a swifter craft for the clumsier old forty-tonner used in the olden days. Nets have undergone a change. We are now using finer, deeper and longer trawls, but hung on the same lines, viz., the thirds. But it is only within the last five years that steam appeared as a rival on the Irish sea, although not as yet a dangerous rival.

The German Government, on the other hand, offers special inducements to build up its fishing industry, giving a premium of about \$2.50 a year to sailors and \$375 to steam drifters. It also grants a subvention to herring sailing companies of \$1,600 toward the building of each sailing vessel known as a lugger, and \$500 for outfit, and long loans to fishermen on extremely low terms. And the Canadian Government grants its fishermen a bounty. Now, if we wish to keep Irish fishermen at home we must follow the example of Canada and Germany. As a source of our country's food supply Irish fisheries are second only in importance to agriculture.

"If we intend to supply our population with pure, wholesome, cheap fish food, free from the germs of tuberculosis, and if trades that are allied to our fishing industry are to be kept working, then I say England must help the fishermen of Ireland."
