The spelling contest at the Union Commercial College last evening was won after a keen contest, by the Shorehead Department. A musical program by the students, some very fine selections by Mr. Duffy's phonograph and luncheon served by the ladies all helped to pass a very pleasant evening.

The death occurred at Fenwick, Nova Scotia on Wednesday of George Dickenson, one of the most highly esteemed residents of that village at the age of 72 years. Deceased had a stroke of paralysis last summer from which he never fully recovered. Besides his wife, two sons and two daughters, are left to mourn the loss of an affectionate husband and father. The sons Clarence and Burton, reside at Fenwick. One married daughter, Mrs. Blight resides in Albert County, N. B., the other lives on Prince Edward Island.

For the second time the N. S. A. A. beat the Charlottetown hockey team by a score of 5 to 0. It was a fast half for the first, and the home team blundered in five easy goals. The visitors were naturally tired after a week's strenuous play night after night. But the second half was the fastest, and by far the hardest game ever played in a Cape Breton rink. The men from the Island had great recuperative powers, and in one of the hottest halves ever witnessed here, neither side scored. It was truly a battle royal, and the fresh man failed to repeat one of the goals so easily gotten in the first. The game was refereed by James Muslok, and his rulings were admittedly the best ever seen in Stratcona Rink.

The death of Roderick McLeod, Orwell, which occurred on January 28th 1907, removed a well known personage from that settlement. He was born in the Isle of Skye, Scotland, emigrated to P. E. Island in 1830 lived on the homestead at Orwell Head for seventy-seven years. He was converted when a young man, under the powerful ministry of the late Rev. Donald McDonald, an elder in Orwell Head Church for over fifty years. At his death he was aged 55 years. He leaves to mourn a widow, three sons and three daughters:—Charles in Dawson, Yukon; Donald in Minnesota and Malcolm in Seal River, P. E. Island; Mrs. Alexander Gillis, Grandview, Mrs. Malcolm Gillis, Lyndale and Mrs. (Captain) Neil Campbell, Australia, Mary, Mrs. Rodrick Matheson, Brackley Point, died about ten years ago.

There is much sympathy felt and expressed for William and Mrs. Leonard and family in their hour of sorrow over the death of their son John, which occurred suddenly in Charlottetown Feb. 10th. Johnny, as he was familiarly known to his many friends, was a general favorite, possessed of a sunny genial disposition. It was a pleasure to meet him at any time. A young man of excellent Christian character and of good scholarly attainments who studied hard and faithfully to fit himself for some honorable calling in life, and when about to enter upon the fruits of his hard labors, the grim messenger, which is called death, called him away. Surely death is no respecter of persons—the young and robust are taken as well as the aged and infirm. To the bereaved family a large circle of friends and acquaintances tender their sincere sympathy.—Com.

HOWARD M. POOLE, the seventeen-year old boy who shot and killed his father, wealthy George Poole, at Taunton, Mass., when his father attacked the mother, was discharged from custody there on the 9th inst, the Grand Jury having found no bill against him. Young Poole was in the house on the night of January 17th, when his father, who had been acting strangely since he met with an accident a year before and whom alienists assert was insane, attacked his mother. He had feared that his father would do his mother bodily harm and he had taken a revolver and placed it in his pocket. His father was throttling his mother when he walked up and placing the revolver behind his father's head, fired. His father fell to the floor dying. The will of the father left Howard the bulk of his property.
