

COMMISSIONER'S REPORT

The following report was read by the District Commissioner, Miss Lillian Duchemin:

"It is my pleasure to submit the following report of the past year's activities of the Charlottetown Girl Guides.

During the year 1942-1943 there were 10 Guide Companies and 6 Brownie Packs functioning in the city. The total enrollment was 328; composed of 207 Guides, 94 Brownies and 27 Company Leaders.

20 Weekly meetings were held from September to June with a good average attendance, and much constructive Guide work was accomplished.

The Gold Cord, which is the highest award a Guide can attain, was presented to Margaret MacLennan of the 6th & 7th (Trinity) Companies.

The All Round Cord, which is awarded to a Girl Guide after she has successfully passed the First Class Tests and holds at least four other Badges, was awarded to Betty King of the 11th and 12th (Zion) Companies.

Five Guides completed their First Class Tests, while other Tests passed for which Badges were presented, included: Second Class, Athlete, Book Lover, Child Nurse, Cook, Fried to Animals, Handymen, Homemaker, Hostess, Laundress, Little House Emblem, Needlewoman, Pathfinder, St. John Ambulance First Aid, Star Lover, Swimmers, Thrift, Toymaker and Traveller. A great many qualified for Service Stars which were presented during the year.

Guide activities were many and varied. They included, besides weekly meetings, Hikes, Halloween, Christmas, Valentine and May Day Parties, and a variety of other social and service projects.

WINTER WORK PROGRAM

During the winter months the Guides were busy with their children. These activities were held at an Afternoon Tea held in St. Paul's Hall in February, and the Beresborough Shield, which was awarded for the best activities, was presented to the 6th and 7th (Trinity) Companies.

Boy Scout and Girl Guide Week was celebrated in February. During this week the Guides attended service in their respective churches, took part in radio programs, assisted in serving at the Afternoon Tea given by the Provincial Executive, and held a Provincial Patrol Leaders' Rally and Public Presentation of Badges in Prince of Wales College Auditorium.

Courses on badge work were conducted as follows: Child Nurse by Miss Sophie Newson, St. John Ambulance First Aid by Miss Nan Reay, and Home Nursing by Mrs. James Montgomery. At the end of the courses, many Guides qualified for the above badges.

They were invited to take part in the V-E Day Parade and celebration on May 8th, and had a splendid turnout. This was much enjoyed, and many of the candidates successfully passed the test.

In July, two very successful camps were held at Holland Cove at which real outdoor Guiding was conducted. I might mention that one Guide, Joan Munroe, was presented with her First Class Badge at Camp exactly one year from the day she was enrolled as a Guide. This is certainly a record, and it is to be hoped other Guides will follow the example set by Joan.

During the past year the various Companies held "Visitors' Nights" to which Commissioners, parents and friends were invited. They were also present at enrollment and other Guide ceremonies held from time to time.

The Guides' Club held monthly meetings at which plans were made for district projects, as well as the securing of instructors for badge courses. In May, the Club
