The Golden Future Of P. E. I.

What the Whig-Standard of Kingston, Ont. Thinks of it.

In its editorial columns The Whig-Standard of Kingston, Ont., has the following review of "The Golden Future":

A Souvenir Edition of The Charlottetown Guardian has just been published in the interest of the development of what is claimed to be "The Garden Province of Canada." A series of articles are given to make this claim good. Thus the Hon. F. R. Hertz, the Lieutenant-Governor of Prince Edward Island, writes upon the bright future for that province, pointing out its natural advantages such as unrivalled summer climate with the heat tempered by the surrounding sea, abundance not only of fresh air but the ozone laden salt air, cool nights conducive to restful slumber, absolutely no fog, wonderful bathing all around the coast, surf bathing in the breakers on the North Shore with its miles of wonderful beaches, still-water bathing in the numerous bays and arms of the sea, landscapes and seascapes of surpassing beauty, sea trout for the catching in many of the tidal rivers running far into the country, abundance of brook trout in the streams and ponds, and deep-sea fishing at many points all along the coast, superb sailing reaches on sheltering harbors and upwinding rivers. He points out the red soil of the island is an asset valuable beyond calculation in the making of the "Garden Province."

Other reliable authorities write upon such subjects as tourist advantages, farm lands for settlers, the fishery industry, the silver fox industry, boards of trade and problems of transport, all of which go to prove that "The Golden Future," of which The Charlottetown Guardian speaks, is not an impossible dream, but can be made an actual reality. A proof of this appears to be found in the statement made by Sir Henry Thornton, the president of the Canadian National Railways, that the island is at present the most prosperous province on that railway's system, the only one which has shown an increase in business during this season, and that he is building a \$750,000 hotel there.

This special number is well printed, and has some excellent illustrations. It contains statistics showing the wealth of the province. Altogether, it should be the means of greatly helping in the development of "The Garden Province of Canada" and hastening its "Golden Future."

On the evening of Thursday October 16th, 1930, in the P. E. Island Hospital Charlottetown, there passed away, Sanford O. MacDonald aged 27 years, and after an illness of eight days. Deceased was a son of Neil MacDonald and Emma Wheeler his wife, of Churchill P. E. Island. About two years ago he married Miss Marilao Campbell, daughter of D. J. Campbell of Argyle Shore who tenderly nursed him during his illness. Besides his parents and wife mentioned above, he is survived by three brothers, Percy on the homestead at Churchill, Howard of Lowell, and Willard of Cambridge Mass. After his marriage he and his wife resided in Massachusetts. Last Summer they came to this province for what was intended to be a short visit. He seemed to have a presentiment that his life would not be long and conversed on religious subjects. During his illness he became deeply convinced of the soul's need and offered prayer to God for his mercy. His prayer was abundantly answered, and although his physical strength yielded to disease, his soul found rest and comfort, and he was able to bear witness to the loved ones about him of his great happiness. God had given him a vision of celestial glory.

The funeral took place on the afternoon of Monday October 20th, from the home of his parents to the cemetery at Argyle Shore. A very large number of people attended to pay a tribute of respect and sympathy. Rev. Ewen MacDougal conducted services at the house and grave. Representatives of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, of which he was a member, were present and held their impressive service.
