EGG LAYING CONTEST.

Notes on the Fifth P. E. Island Egg Laying Contest for the 27th Week of the Contest, Ending May 8, 1923.

The P. E. Island Egg Laying Contest made a slight gain during the past week; quite a number of the birds are broody.

Mr. J. J. McGillivray's White Leghorns led the contest for the week, with 53 eggs; Mr. Everett Howatt's White Leghorns were 2nd with 52 eggs; Mr. Bert Brown's Barred Rocks were 3rd with 48 eggs; Mrs. Edward Bullpitt's White Leghorns were 4th with 46 eggs; the Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 18 was 5th, with 45 eggs; Colonel Crockett's Barred Rocks tied with Mr. Wendell Graham's Anconas for 6th place with a production of 44 eggs each; Pendleton Bros.' Barred Rocks were 7th with 43 eggs; Mr. H. L. Machon's Barred Rocks were 8th, with 42 eggs; and Mrs. James E. Daly's Barred Rocks were 9th with 41 eggs for the week.

Mrs. Edward Bullpitt's White Leghorns lead the contest to date, with a production of 936 eggs; the

Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 18 was 2nd, with 907 eggs; Mr. Augustine Wisner's White Wyandottes were 3rd with 904 eggs; and Mr. D. F. McDonald's Barred Rocks 4th, with 876 eggs; Pendleton Bros.' Barred Rocks rank 5th, with 839 eggs; the Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 18 tied with Mr. J. J. McGillivray's pen of White Leghorns for 6th place with a production of 811 eggs each, and Mr. Everett Howatt's pen of White Leghorns is 7th, with 783 eggs to date.

At the close of the week 21 birds had passed the 100-egg mark. The leading pens to date are: D. F. McDonald's Barred Rocks No. 77 and 79 have laid 128 and 129 eggs respectively; Mr. J. J. McGillivray's hen No. 206 has laid 122 eggs, and the Experimental Station's hen No. 181 (White Leghorn) has laid 121 eggs.
