

TAFT IS TOASTED

BY W. J. BRYAN

President Gives Rival Credit in World Peace Plan

HASTINGS, Neb., Oct. 4.—President Taft sped across the State of Nebraska today and tonight is on his way to Denver, where he is due at 9 o'clock tomorrow. Mr. Taft spent a part of the forenoon in Omaha and stopped two hours at Lincoln, the home of his former political adversary, William Jennings Bryan. He was entertained here this evening at a banquet. Mr. Bryan helped to welcome the President to Lincoln and at the Commercial Club luncheon proposed the health of the chief executive in "the beverage upon which the almighty has set the seal of his approval."

DRUNK IN WATER

It was drunk therefore in sparkling water. Mr. Taft and Mr. Bryan exchanged felicitations, and seemed as always to enjoy their meeting.

The entertainment of the President at Omaha, at Lincoln and here tonight was of a non-partisan character, but the atmosphere was surcharged with politics. Mr. Taft had a hearty welcome in all three cities. At Lincoln it seemed that the entire population turned out. But the Republican leaders with whom the President and Secretary Hilles talked were anything but optimistic over the prospect of harmonizing the party in the State.

TO SUPPORT LA FOLLETTE

Governor Aldrich accompanied the President on his trip from Omaha, but the Presidential party had scarce-

ly left Lincoln before a letter by the Governor was made public, in which he announced he would support Senator La Follette for the presidential nomination and that his decision to do so was unequivocal.

Governor Aldrich's letter was addressed to Ross Hammond, a collector of internal revenue at Omaha, and was intended to set at rest rumors that his adherence to the La Follette movement was luke-warm. Friends of the Governor said that he had hesitated to use his position to influence members of the party, but now he had determined to let everyone know just where he stood, regardless of consequences.

PRESIDENT'S GUESTS

Senator Norris Brown, a supporter of the President, Victor Rosewater, a Republican national committeeman, a staunch friend of the President, and several members of the Nebraska delegation increasing, were also the President's guests today. Representative Norris, the insurgent leader in the House, did not put in an appearance.

At Omaha and at Lincoln Mr. Taft spoke on world peace. Here he again took up the tariff veto. The President said that international peace was one subject upon which he and Mr. Bryan agreed, and amid the plaudits of the latter's fellow townsmen, Mr. Taft gave Mr. Bryan credit for having suggested one of the most important provisions in the pending treaties for arbitration between the United States and Great Britain and France.

He referred to the clause creating a high joint commission to consider questions of difference before they are

finally referred to an arbitral court, and to the further provision that this commission should take a full year to consider its findings and recommendations.

"I heard the suggestion of such a provision in a treaty of peace and arbitration was from your distinguished fellow citizen, Mr. Bryan. He came in to see me at Washington and said he thought it would greatly add to the efficiency of any agreement of this sort if we had a preliminary investigation that should be right last a year for negotiation and consideration, because he thought that the spending of that time would lay the fury and heat of popular indignation and would be a long step toward peaceful solution. We agree with him and that went into the treaty."

WANTS JAPAN IN TREATIES

In his discussion of the treaties today Mr. Taft made his first reference to Japan and expressed the hope that that country might come into such an agreement with the United States. "We are not looking for insults from other nations and we don't fear insults from other nations. We are big enough, even if we should be insulted by anybody, to do just what a great strong man does when he is insulted under conditions where he can restrain himself at all. He holds himself in and says I am a greater man because I resist the temptation to lick your pusillanimous little boy," Taft said.

"I want to give you one instance of the very beneficial effects of the negotiations of these treaties. England was bound to Japan under treaty with Japan in such a way that it was doubtful—I would not say it was more than that—whether, if she made an agreement to arbitrate everything with us she was not violating an agreement with Japan by which she might be bound to fight us on something."

"What did Japan do? Japan notified England that so far as the arbi-

tration between her and the United States was concerned, that if in any way she abrogated their treaty of offensive and defensive alliance, then they abated their treaty to that extent.
