A. She had no bad bruises but died a few days afterwards.
 The Supreme Court resumed its session again at 2.30 p. m. This cross examination of the accused by the Attorney General was continued. Q. Where did you go Sunday morning?
 A. I went down town.
 Q. What streets did you take?
 A. I don't know the streets in town; don't pay any attention to them.

On further questioning, the accused stated that, after going along Rochford Street, he cut across Connaught Square, crossed Street and went down the east side of it to King Street. He went into George Sheppard's, which is entered through an alley way. Then he went straight across the street to Chipman's.
 Q. Do you remember meeting a man on Rochford Street?
 A. Yes, Sir.
 Q. Was it Mr. Toombs?
 A. Yes, Sir. He turned and followed me. I pretty nearly ran into him at King Street.
 Q. Do you remember that you were arrested on the first of October?
 A. I wouldn't say it was that date.

Q. Do you remember what you were arrested for?
 A. Yes, sir. Kicking up a racket with Sheppard. I wasn't swearing at Bridge's. Higgins arrested me at the corner, not at Bridge's. I was going to beat up Sheppard.
 Q. It wasn't a woman this time?
 A. No, sir, it was no woman.
 Re-examined by Mr. MacKinnon:
 Q. When were you last to see your wife?
 A. The Thursday night before I was arrested. I used to see her most every time I was in town.

Q. What are your relations with your wife?
 A. Great, sir.
 Q. She is ill, is she not?
 A. She has been bedfast for three years.
 Q. Where is her home?
 A. Brackley Point Road.
 Q. Have you a farm?
 A. Yes, sir.
 Q. Were these the boots you had on?

A. No, sir.
 Officer Biggar (sworn) examined by the Attorney General.
 I went to Bridge's to arrest Matthews on Sunday about 11 p. m. Higgins with me. Saw Mr. and Mrs. Bridges upstairs. We called to them, and Bridges came part way down. We asked if Matthews was there, and Bridges replied that he had not been there since nine o'clock last night, and that he had left his horse at the livery stable.
 He had been arrested on the first of October in front of the house of George Bridges. He was disorderly on the street, cursing and swearing and kicking on Bridge's door.
 Cross examined by Mr. MacKinnon:
 I wasn't at Bridge's house on the first of October.
 Q. You say he was on the street, making a noise?
 A. Yes, Sir. We were ten or fifteen yards from him when we saw him first, going north on the west side of the street. When he saw us he came towards us. We picked him up about five yards from Bridge's house.
 Q. And he started down towards you?
 A. Yes.
 Q. He didn't try to escape you?
 A. No.
 Q. Wasn't he looking for Sheppard?

A. I don't know.
 Q. May not that be perfectly true?
 A. It may be.
 Q. What time were you in Bridge's on Sunday?
 A. About 11 o'clock in the day.
 Q. Had you any statement when you went into the house?
 A. Took statement from Mrs. Bridges. She couldn't sign it, but made a mark.
 Q. You tried to get a statement from her after he had gone to jail?
 A. I got one.
 Q. Did she complain of Matthews then?
 A. No, sir.
 Q. "Go home" here at 2.30, witnesses went to their parties with me. I was there during the day.
 I don't know whether they knew he was drinking, or not. They told us he wasn't there since nine o'clock last night.
 Re-examined by the Attorney General. He told me that the first time I was there he was up stairs having a drink.
 Mr. MacKinnon—So you think he was there?
 A. He told me so.
 Police Officer Higgins, examined by Mr. Saunders:
 "When we went into the house, we heard people talking upstairs. We started to go upstairs and then George Bridges came down three

MARKETS

MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 20.—There was a fair inquiry from the United Kingdom for Canadian western oats here today, but as the prices were out of line no business resulted. Trading in cash grain in the local market was of a limited character, the demand being only for odd cars for domestic and country account and prices were unchanged. The movement of spring and winter wheat grades of flour was small but values were firm. The millfeed market was fairly active, the trade was moderately active and prices ruled firm. Odd cars of P. E. I. Green Mountains were sold at \$1.20 per bag of 90 lbs; P. E. I. white potatoes at \$1.15 per bag of 90 lbs; New Brunswick Green Mountains at \$1.10 per bag of 90 lbs in bulk. New Brunswick white potatoes at \$1.05 per bag of 90 lbs in bulk and Quebec varieties at 95 cents to \$1.00 per bag of 90 lbs in bulk, ex-track. Prices for imported beans were firm with a small trade passing. Cans of choice white handpicked were at \$2.80 ex-track and smaller quantities at \$2.90 per bushel, ex-store. The trade in butter continued in active but values were firm. The receipts were 109 packages. Extreme dullness again marked the cheese trade but the undertone was steady. The receipts were 178 boxes.

OTTAWA, Jan. 20.—There is a further reduction in the spot price of B. C. hests and pullet extras in the east today. Markets on the whole have a firmer undertone. TORONTO—There is much better tone to this market and consumption has become much heavier at a reduced price. Fresh eggs are clearing more closely and storage eggs are not offering so freely with the result that there is a general tendency to firmer prices.

MONTREAL—Jobbing prices on B. C. eggs on spot here are now extra 45, firsts pullet extra 35, Ontario are jobbing at extra 44, firsts 40, seconds 34, for fresh and extra 36, firsts 30, seconds 25 for storage.
EDMONTON—The egg market here has weakened higher and fresh eggs are now selling to retailers at extra 47, firsts 45, seconds 33. **ST. JOHN**—The egg market here is quiet and weak with prices irregular. More fresh eggs are being used as prices decline and storage stocks cleaned up. Receipts are greater than local consumption and supplies are going to Montreal and Halifax.
