**Interesting Service At St. Pauls Church On Whit Sunday**

The services in St. Paul's Anglican Church, on the Festival of Whit Sunday, which was also Empire Day, were attended by large congregations. The Rev. At 8.30 a. m., there was a celebration of the Holy Communion at the 11 o'clock service, the subject of the sermon was "The Nation's Soul" and it was listened to with rapt attention by all. As Canon Cummings had served as Army Chaplain for three years during the Great War, his forceful and eloquent remarks inspired all his hearers, young and old, with the true spirit of patriotism.

His address to the children was most pleasing and instructive, explaining to them in a simple way, the meaning of the four great Festivals of the Church. The subject of his evening sermon was "The Victorious Church", when he spoke of the wonderful outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost, which day we were commemorating on this festival of Whit Sunday.

AMHERST, May 26—In the first big fight card here for some time, Fighting Billy Holm, Maritime welterweight champion, upheld his honors here yesterday evening against Jack McKenna in a ten round bout that was full of snap from start to finish. Two lively junior bouts served as preliminaries, Malcolm McDonald winning from George Hood in the fourth, and Gerow and Teris, of Springhill, going to a six round draw.

**Premier Lea**

It was moved by James McCordle and seconded by Charles Neider, that Hon. Walter M. Lea be nominated as Councilman. This was also unanimously adopted. Premier Lea dwelt at length on the improvement of the roads under the present administration and stated that in the last election campaign prohibition was the chief issue, all other issues were sunk. He then reviewed the promises made by him during the campaign in regard to prohibition, everyone of which had been performed to the letter, although it has been one of the hardest to enforce. At the end of his long speech, Hon. Mr. Lea failed to announce to the electors when they might expect the election, but said that it would be some time before next March or at least before the end of the year.

Mr. Horace Wright followed with a speech which was mostly taken up with the public accounts and reasons why the prohibition law was not enforced 100 percent. It was more the fault of the people for not giving information to the commission than the fault of the prohibition commission was his claim. The chairman called for other speakers, but there was no response. S.

given new hope of enjoying happy and useful lives as a result of his work, now number several hundreds. The Red Cross holds these clinics twice a year and children are brought from all parts of the province for advice and treatment for their handicapped conditions.

In the past few days 115 children have been examined and appointments made for about 40 adults, making the largest attendance at any one clinic since their inauguration six years ago. Also it has been a most satisfactory one as several cases were discharged as cured and good results were noted from the daily exercising, massage and training advised to be carried out at home by the parents, this latter feature being an important part in the treatment of restoring function to paralyzed, weak or contracted muscles, etc. Various types of cases were examined, flat feet, weak feet, club feet, dislocated hips, deformities due to rickets, bone tuberculosis, spinal curvatures, infantile and other forms of paralyzed limbs, long necks, arthritis and other joint deformities, etc., and something, fortunately, could be done to give relief to all.

Splendid assistance and co-operation was given by the local doctors and hospitals during operations on twelve of the children. Measurements were taken for braces and other kinds of apparatus necessary in treatment.
