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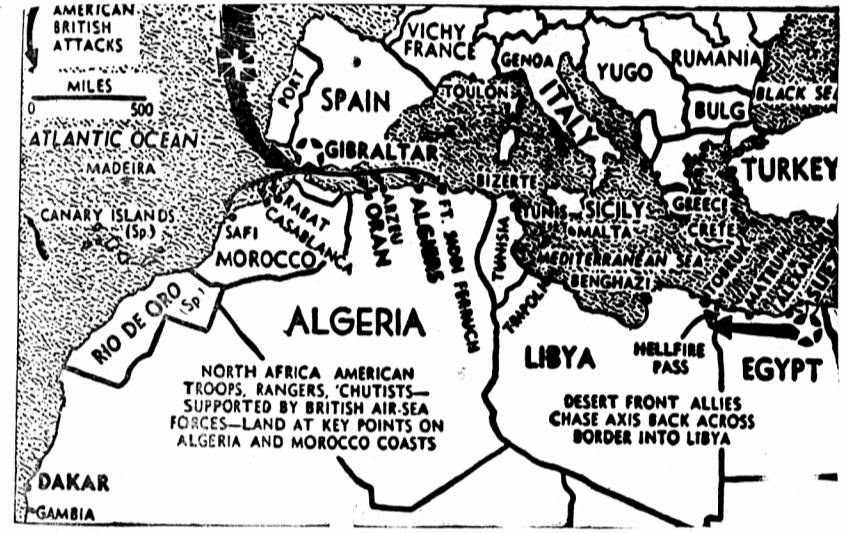

War Situation Last Night

With the fall of Tobruk to the British 8th Army in eastern Libya and indicated Anglo-American advances from the west into Tunisia, the original 1,500-mile gap between the jaws of the Allied trap closing on Rommel's shattered and fleeing Axis desert army in Africa has shriveled to 900 miles. Against that dual threat, driving in upon him from both sides at a pace unmatched in any previous phase of the give-and-take British-Axis campaign in Africa, Rommel's chances of escaping complete annihilation are dwindling every hour. There are strong indications that Berlin already has abandoned hope of salvaging what it can from Africa by sea and air evacuation.

Joseph Stalin Comments On Situation

MOSCOW, Nov. 14—(Saturday)—(AP)—Joseph Stalin declared today that the American and British campaign in Africa has turned the military and political position in Europe, radically in favor of the Allies, opening the way for the early collapse of the German and Italian Axis.

Cross Frontier; Nazis In Tunis

To the east British 8th Army captures Tobruk; Rommel's Army "Completely Smashed".

LONDON, Nov. 14—(Saturday)—(CP)—French Tunisian garrisons were reported fighting German tanks and paratroopers in Tunis early today as dispatches said Allied troops had swept across that protectorate's western frontier amid appeals by Vice-Admiral Jean Darlan for all Frenchmen to lay down their arms and join the Allies.

8TH ARMY ROLLS ON
Far to the east in Libya the British 8th Army rolled on after occupying Tobruk without opposition, and Marshal Rommel's fleeing remnants were being pounded by Allied armor already operating from captured Libyan air fields.

A dispatch from Allied headquarters in North Africa told of the French Tunisian uprising against the Germans who were said to be trying desperately to control the capital of Tunis. Nazi parachute troops were said to be in control of an airport outside the capital.

TRANSPORT PLANES DOWNED
This information conflicted slightly with an earlier R.A.F. report that said six Italian transport planes carrying Nazi troops north across the Mediterranean had been shot down. The R.A.F. had deduced that the Germans were leaving their infiltrated Tunisian positions, but it also was probable that the destroyed planes were flying from Tripoli or some other point in Libya rather than from Tunisia.

CROSS FRONTIER
A Reuters News Agency dispatch from Tangier said British troops had crossed the Algeria-Tunisian frontier in the speedy effort to close all North Africa to the Axis.

Allied headquarters opinion was said to be reserved on the prospect of the Tunisian Frenchmen responding to Admiral Darlan's appeal, but it was apparent that French hatred had precipitated the battle with the Germans and this was viewed here as favorable to the Allied position. Algeria and Morocco already have swung mostly into the Allied fold, and French dock workers are aiding the Allied advance. United States and British armor were said to be taking a heavy toll of Axis armor trying to stem the surge toward Tunisia.

Enemy Smashed
Gen. B. L. Montgomery, commander of the army chasing Marshal Rommel, said the enemy has been "completely smashed," losing at least 30,000 prisoners and vast stocks of war material. He named 12 Axis divisions, four German and eight Italian, which he said are no longer effective fighting formations, and ordered his cleanup forces onward with the words "good hunting to you all."

Unconfirmed reports said also that Axis ships were setting sail from Bengasi, port on the Libyan coast, with 400 tons of supplies across the Gulf of Sirte from Tripoli itself.

The Allied force headquarters communique this evening contained Thursday's report that the east-bound Allied combined force in French North Africa had "extended the Algerian zone of occupation as far as Bone," 60 miles from the Tunisian frontier.

Raid Warnings
Sound In Berne
LONDON, Nov. 13—(CP)—Air raid warnings sounded tonight in the Swiss cities of Berne, Geneva and Lausanne. (Such warnings usually indicate the R.A.F. is flying to attack Italy but there was no word on that tonight.)

New Record For Ship Construction
SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 13—(AP)—A 4,000-ton freighter floated in San Francisco Bay today 30 hours after her keel was laid, smashing all records for speedy ship construction.

Nazis Keep Sharp Watch On Fleet

Nazi U-Boat Seeks Food

LONDON, Nov. 13—(AP)—The main French fleet, object of a vital tug-of-war between the Allied Nations and the Axis, still rode at anchor in Toulon Harbor today, watched intently from the skies by the German Air Force lest it make a break into the Mediterranean. The Germans went ahead with their swift occupation of Southern France but they stayed pointedly away from the immediate area of Toulon. There was no doubt among naval men, however, that Nazi bombers would attack the instant it became apparent the port was open.

OTTAWA, Nov. 13—(CP)—Delegates to the Conservative National Convention at Winnipeg, Dec. 9, 10 and 11 are being urged to take tourist car accommodation when travelling and to arrange to "double up" in hotel rooms—all in line with the convention committee's policy of encouraging wartime economy-party spokesmen said today.

Expenditures Pared

Previously the committee announced that elaborate metal badges would not be provided for delegates who would get small, colorful nameplates instead. Expenditures on printing have been reduced in comparison with past conventions and booklets issued to delegates will give them necessary information in the simplest form possible. Convention committee headquarters said the convention will open on Monday, Dec. 9, with registration of delegates beginning at 3 p.m. the previous day and concluding until 10 p.m. Registration booths will be open all day Dec. 9 for the convenience of delegates expected to attend.

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Australia, Nov. 14—(Saturday)—(CP)—The stalling of more than 500 Japanese in the Gortari area by Allied troops fighting their way out of the Owen Stanley Mountains toward the north New Guinea coast was announced today by the high command.

NEW YORK, Nov. 13—(CP)—Canada's labor minister, Humphrey Mitchell, arrived here today after a visit of several weeks in Britain. The Minister, who made the Atlantic crossing by ship, expects to leave for Ottawa tomorrow.

BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 13—(AP)—The Argentine government announced tonight that the United States government had presented to it three memoranda charging the existence of Nazi espionage in Argentina.

PANAMA, Nov. 13—(AP)—Panama's foreign minister today broke relations with the Vichy regime because of the Axis occupation of France.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13—(AP)—President Roosevelt today signed the bill providing for the drafting of 18- and 19-year-olds in the United States.

LONDON, Nov. 13—(CP)—Reuters News Agency quoted the Vichy radio as saying that Axis planes had made several raids on American-occupied Bone in Algeria, causing damage and civilian casualties.

Flaxseed production is also placed over at 14,991,000 bushels, almost 2,000,000 bushels below the earlier estimate.

The 1942 potato crop is estimated at 42,097,000 hundred-weight, a reduction of 850,000 from the October estimate.

The 1942 hay and clover crop at 16,942,000 tons is 1,444,000 tons above the first estimate.

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The westbound British have encountered for days virtually no Axis air opposition. Rommel's men are running almost unsheltered from air strafing.

What has become of German-Italian air power in Africa is a puzzling enigma. It may have been massed westward to meet the American occupation of French Morocco, Algeria and Tunisia. Insistent but unconfirmed Axis reports of damage inflicted on British-American warcraft and shipping suggest that.

If so, however, Hitler sent a small boy to do a man-size job. It signally failed to halt or even slow up the American thrust. Berlin was obviously guilty of the same fault this time that has so frequently plagued Britain and her allies. It was the Axis which was too late with too little, and reports that Hitler has removed his air commander there sound plausible.

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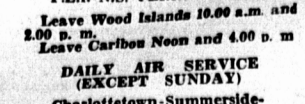
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LOIS O' DOUGH DOES NOT MAKE YOU WELL BRED
