Surviving besides his wife the former Ruth Nye Leonard and his mother, Mrs. George J. Smith, four sisters, Maud, Mrs. Edward A. DeWolfe, South Dartmouth, Mrs. Samuel Taylor and Mrs. (Dr.) Horatio Allen of New Bedford and two brothers, Franklin E. of the Admiralty in England, for many years, and Horace P. of Sparlandburgh, South Carolina. Many close friends extend sympathy to the bereaved family all former Charlottetown residents.
