Persons may join the club at any time after explained, to qualify for the prizes. It is however, desirable that the questions be answered as the lessons are studied.

The International Newspaper Bible Study Club is for the purpose of promoting, in an unfeigned way among the masses, a wider study of the Bible, the basal truths of Christianity,

and the problems which enter into every man's life. It is composed of all those who join a Local Club, and take up the simple course herein outlined bearing City ordained clergymen. Although with their sympathetic co-operation, it is not considered fair to have them compete for the prizes. It is however desirable that the Bible Class scholars, and churchgoers generally, may belong to this newspaper Club, also non-churchgoers, of all shades of opinion. All such who have not joined are warmly invited to do so and compete for the prizes.

The Guardian has secured the right to publish the International Sunday School Lesson questions by Rev. Dr. Linscott, D.D. which have aroused so much interest elsewhere, and they will appear weekly. One of these questions each week is to be answered in writing, and upon these answers the prizes are to be awarded.

The Guardian is authorized to form a Local Newspaper Bible Study Club for its readers, and guarantees to all who join and fulfil the conditions, that everything here promised shall be faithfully carried out.

CONDITIONS OF THE CONTEST.

1. Each contestant, or his or her family, must be a paid in advance subscriber to the Guardian, during the continuance of the contest, in order to qualify for membership in the International Newspaper Bible Study Club and thus Local Club.

2. Each contestant in this Local Club must answer each of the written questions for 52 consecutive weeks, commencing for Sunday, August 23rd and the answers must all be two weeks of the close of this period, which allows two weeks grace after the close of the contest.

3. Each question must be answered separately, and the paper written on one side only. No answer must contain more than two hundred words and may be less. It will be a convenience if students will write their answers on letter paper, about 8 1/2 inches by 11 inches.

1. Each answer must have the name and address of the writer at the bottom of the answer, together with the date label of a current issue of the Guardian so it can be identified, giving a number, registered, and then the name will be cut out of so the examiner may know by number only.

5. Students should be careful to understand the question before answering.

First Series—A gold medal to each of the first five contestants.

Second Series—A silver medal to each of the next five contestants.

Third Series—A Teacher's Bible, price \$5.50, to each of the next five contestants.

Fourth Series—The book "The Heart of Christianity," price \$1.50 to each of the next thirty-five contestants.

Fifth Series—A developed mind, an expanded imagination a richer experience and more profound knowledge of the Bible and of life, to all who take this course, whether winning any other prize or not.

Each medal will be suitably engraved, giving the name of the winner and for what it is awarded, and in the like manner each Bible and book will be inscribed.

All who can write, and have ideas, are urged to take up these studies regardless of the degree of their education, as the papers are not valued from an educational or literary standpoint, but from the point of view of the cogency of their reasoning ideas.

REPORT OF GRAND SCRIBE OF S. OF T.

Alberton, January 29th, 1909.

To the officers and representatives of the Grand Division Sons of Temperance P. E. I.

As we meet today in our first quarterly session of the New Year our first word should be one of gratitude to the Father of Mercies for his great goodness toward us in that He hath spared us to see each other again and to take counsel together concerning the work in which we are engaged. The past three months have been many of our workers filled with happy and successful toil in the good cause we have at heart, and yet while happy in the work, there comes to us at times a feeling of sadness because the best we can do is so poor as compared with the greatness of the task which lies before us. We have reached a period in the history of Temperance Reform in this province when it is very important that we do not slacken the very least of our efforts to strengthen our cause. To falter at such a time would be to court failure. The forces of the enemy are organized and effective. Our organization must be thorough and complete. The strength of evil in the world must be resisted by the forces of good, and though the struggle may be long the right must prevail. Let us not forget, may I mention the great pleasure it gives us to meet with the faithful and zealous brethren of Alberton Division whose cordial invitation to meet with you we eagerly accepted. May our deliberations today be characterized by deep earnestness and sincerity. May the problems we seek to solve, the questions we are called upon to consider, offer in their solution the only possible basis for the world's further social progress. In accordance with the law and usage the following summary of the work of our Order for the past quarter is made up from the returns as received. Refuge is again our banner division with a membership of 133.

It is again pleasing to note that our Order is still growing, that it shows no signs of decadence in the least, but on the other hand is adding daily new material new energy and enthusiasm to our cause. One regrettable annoyance in depleting our ranks is caused by that old enemy "Suspension of dues" cannot some measure be adopted to lessen our losses through this cause? Much I presume may depend on the business integrity of the Financial Scribe. What to do that this deterioration may be stayed should be vigorously grappled with while we are together.

It is pleasing to note that there has been practically no friction in the working of our order during the past quarter. It has been rather a summoning together of the forces in our ranks after the busy autumn season. It is now a time when our divisions generally are in a healthy and flourishing condition. I have only to say that the workers in our subordinate divisions could further the interests of our order very much by remembering what is the nature of our Mission. The Division is not a social club primarily, nor is it a mutual improvement association, nor a debating society, much less is it a dancing class.

In the pursuit of this aim it is well to use all possible means social, moral, and intellectual. The Local Division should be a home, a shelter and a school and from it influences should go forth in favor of whatever is pure, lovely and of good report.

I am pleased to report that our two new District Divisions have entered upon their work during the

quarter most auspiciously. District Division No. 2 which met at Clifton on Nov. 20th was well attended. The delegates present showed much enthusiasm and a desire to expand the organization of a new division in their jurisdiction. I would here re-assembled today would place this division "Sterling" No. 276 on the roll call of District Division No. 2.

We can only reaffirm our conviction that our District meetings are of the greatest possible benefit and should be jealously fostered and encouraged. I would like to emphasize the value of the work of district Divisions. Its organization is valuable to the maintenance of our subordinate divisions and should therefore receive our earnest and sympathetic support. District Scribe G. W. He was one of our foundation builders of our Grand Division which is occupying today so honorable and conspicuous a place in the van of reform. The loss of such workers should be an admonition to us all. We are face to face with death every moment. His sternness and unwavering fidelity for the right made him respected by both old and young. Every quarter as we meet to review the past and plan for the future we miss familiar faces and stop for a moment to look back and remember the loyal services of those whose hands have been clasped in ours and who will never again join in these earthly councils. They rest from their labors while we work on.

(a) The licensing and registration of all Motor Vehicles.

(b) The numbering of all Motor vehicles in large plain figures.

(c) The adoption of proper speed limits.

(d) The avoidance of places of public worship during hours of Divine Worship on the Sabbath Day.

(e) The stopping of Motor Vehicles and the working of their engines when meeting or overtaking teams if signalled or requested by the driver of the team to do so.

(f) And such regulations as the legislature may deem necessary to assure the safety of the travelling public.

(g) The imposing of severe penalties for the infraction of any of the proposed regulations including the revoking of the license of any Motor Vehicle whose driver has been convicted.
