Mrs. Wm. Brown, Florida Hotel, Pownall, who has been ill for some time, has gone on a visit to Boston and other American cities for the benefit of her health.

There were 50 passengers from East River ports by the SS City of London yesterday morning and the following cargo: 5 barrels oysters, 10 bags potatoes and a crate of pigs.

At the meeting of the Executive Council Thursday evening the plans and specifications for the new steamer for the City of London's present route were accepted. The new steamer will be a twin screw boat as large as the steamer at present on the route.

The body of George Gilroy, the sailor who was drowned in this harbor on Thursday has not yet been found. Capt. Gilroy has sent his schooner on to Halifax with her cargo, and will stay here to help in the search for his son's body. A number of boats are expected to assist tomorrow.

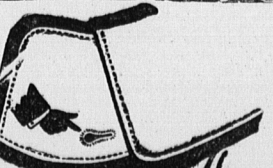
